1 John 2:3-11, Luke 2:22-35

Christ is born. Let us worship Him. The love of God has become tangible. The Son of God came among us to bring us salvation. St. Bernard puts it quite beautifully. "Our eyes were darkened, yet he dwells in light inaccessible, and lying paralyzed on our mats we could not reach the divine height. That is why our most gracious Savior and Healer of souls both descended from his lofty height and dimmed his brilliance for our weak eyes" (Sermons for Advent and Christmas, #9). God loves us so much, that He accommodates himself to our weakness. Through the mystery of the Incarnation God teaches us to empty ourselves of all attachments, and anything that keeps us from relying totally on Him. "Life passes, riches fly away, popularity is fickle, the senses decay, the world changes. One alone is true to us; One alone can be all things to us; One alone can supply our need" (John Henry Newman). God alone is enough. We can find the happiness he wants for us by letting him guide us, by being mindful of his loving presence. When we ponder the Word of God in our hearts, the Word that became flesh in the womb of the Virgin Mary takes flesh in us. We conform ourselves to him by possessing obedient and loving faith. The Spirit that overshadowed the Blessed Virgin expresses itself in our acts of love and compassion towards others. Through us, God continues to seek out the lost who have a special claim on his loving compassion. Man is God's possession by virtue of his choice made in love. He expands our hearts so that his compassionate heart might love in ours. In his Christmas homily of 1964, St. Paul VI offered this exhortation. "May you know today how to lovingly cuddle your children. May you know today how to associate with a little extra charity for the poor, the suffering, the derelict, the young, and you will have a sincere Christmas, a regenerating Christmas, a happy Christmas" (Pope St. Paul VI).

Christmas teaches us that God did not look down upon us and pass us by but rather, He assumed our nature and our human condition, in all things but sin. When the Word became flesh, it was God's outrageous effort to be born among us and in our hearts. Jesus longs to be a light in each of our hearts. He knows about our darkness and wants to shine in our lives. We achieve the fulfillment of our destiny through the sincere gift of self, a gift that is made possible only through our encounter with God. Jesus, in the crib, shows us the way of tenderness to be close to each other, to be human.

Nativity Prayer of St. Bernard of Clairvaux

"Let your goodness Lord appear to us, that we, made in your image, may conform ourselves to it. In our own strength, we cannot imitate your majesty, power, and wonder nor is it fitting for us to try. But your mercy reaches from the heavens through the clouds to the earth below. You have come to us as a small child, but you have brought us the greatest of all gifts, the gift of eternal love. Caress us with your tiny hands, embrace us with your tiny arms, and pierce our hearts with your soft, sweet cries."



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Children were part of the celebration of the evening Mass (our parish school of religion) this past Monday. Typically, I ask them what was the best part of their day. Some say recess. another mentioned lunch time. Eventually there comes the response 'being here'. Seems that over the years the response of 'being here' (present at the Eucharistic Table) becomes the go-to response. (Might prompt us to reflect on our presence at liturgy as well.) During the homily I asked about the word "hero." (One young child responded that they liked a turkey hero (as in the sandwich). I was attempting to



introduce the hero born to Hannah who was Samuel. (Hannah's song is similar to Our Lady's canticle.) In keeping her promise to the Lord, she dedicated her son Samuel for service in the shrine at Shiloh. There he worked under Eli. He received a call 'Samuel, Samuel' three times while sleeping close to the Ark. The call three times and at the counsel of Eli responded

'speak your servant is listening' and so the beginning of an heroic journey as prophet and priest. Much later it was Samuel who went to Bethlehem and anointed David as king. This we appreciate would be the association with the birth of Jesus (Christ the King) in Bethlehem who would be acknowledged as priest and prophet and King. The hero's journey brought about salvation. We acknowledge that Jesus won for us salvation. Truth be told there is an implication that we too are called to live heroic lives in His name. After baptism comes the anointing with the sacred chrism. The prayer spoken 'as Christ was anointed Priest, Prophet and King so may you live always as a member of His body sharing everlasting life'. I wonder about the words of Eli who told Samuel to say 'speak your servant is listening'. Do we seek to attend to the Word of the Lord? Do we hear and do according to His word? The Latin 'obedire' means to hear and give ear and to pay attention. How well do we carry out the words
GO IN THE PEACE OF CHRIST. The hero born to us lives within us. To that degree our attentiveness to daily renewal might prompt or bring forth a deeper desire to learn and cultivate the life born to us. As we acknowledge, as well, the one we are baptized into may we appreciate our daily actions as displaying the likeness of Jesus Himself

While preparing for Monday evening's PSR, the line that stuck out to me in the Gospel of John was were the words of John the Baptist stating "A man is coming after me who ranks ahead of me because he existed before me." I did not know him, but the reason why I came baptizing with water was the he might be made known to Israel." The very next day in Tuesday's vespers reading was the verse "The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him." I have to admit that sometimes I stumble over these lines because in my heart I desire to know him. I want to be an image of him so the world knows him through my relationship with him. So, I go down the road of what can seem like Bobbi Bashing but is just a reflection of my desire to fully walk the path of Jesus. Know what I found? It will take a lifetime. Some of my life lessons that profoundly changed me happened at times where I could do nothing. Like when I told someone I could not do anything but listen and promised to pray for them, and they looked at me and said "I never had someone pray for me before." That is when I realized that in this world, it is possible to not know of Jesus as Messiah even if one has heard the name before. I learned this over time that I may never fully understand, but I have come to know in my limited capacity of understanding what Jesus as the light of the world means to me. The other way I have come to know Jesus is through his followers. The letters. I thought of those when I remembered how my husband Bob and I wrote letters to each other all through college. (Before personal computer and cell phones!) We wrote about those things in life that were normal and changing. It was on paper and I could reread it over and over. We got to know each other, we would be present when not near each other. Sometimes reading the letters of the New Testament, I could understand fears, misunderstanding written about the followers. All of these shaped me over time and I experienced being present in the relationship. Following in the footsteps of Jesus sometimes felt like going against the world and it was but slowly overtime, I learned to continue on, I grew and continue to grow in faith. One step at a time learning that God is always present and always loving. I will continue to struggle in the world that does not know him in the light that I am slowing being healed in knowing Jesus a little more each day. Gradual, one step at a time. This healing for me, a continual walk of faith that I am able to take out into the world and hopefully be an image of Christ for others. To be that one inspiration that brings Jesus to someone who does not know him. It is the gradual change of heart, the mercy, compassion, forgiveness that I have received that hopefully I pass on to others. I have thought of people in my life who called me on this path. I have thought of my responses, some good and some bad, but you want to know the best part. I am grateful that over time I am learning to walk the path of Jesus the Messiah.


