Continued From Last Weeks Bulletin

Then it is not just the sweet baby Jesus waiting to be admired. But the Lord who has parachuted into enemy territory, almost behind enemy lines when the dragon was not looking - so that He could begin to win over souls from the enemy one soul at a time and slowly push back the darkness, taking captive the powers and the principalities in the high places.

In such a context, brothers, watching will be painful. Seeing is easy. You do not have to do much. You can be lazy. You can continue in the sloth of disobedience. But watching means tension. It means ripping off the band aids in your own heart. The lies and subterfuges whereby we hide from the light. This is painful enough but furthermore, our eyes open and the pain of the world rushes in. We become sharers in God's heartache as His creation turns rogue and ungrateful. I think of our first reading today. The prophet lived around 3000 years ago but you would be hard-pressed to find something so beautiful in all of literature. It is one of the most beautiful and heart-rending examples of what it means to watch, to be prophetic, to suffer with God's heartache -

*Would that you might meet us doing right,
that we were mindful of you in our ways!
Behold, you are angry, and we are sinful;
all of us have become like unclean people,
all our good deeds are like polluted rags;
we have all withered like leaves,
and our guilt carries us away like the wind.
There is none who calls upon your name,
who rouses himself to cling to you;*

This is a call to us as monks. Monks have been traditionally known as watchmen - awake in the dark, contending with the dark, looking for the dawn. Advent is our season really even though St Benedict says our life should be a permanent Lent. But both go together. We have to maintain the tension, we have to live by faith, accept the boredom, the restlessness of not seeing but watching with no end in sight. Without this, the world will not open its pain to us. We will live at the shallow end of the pool. Without the tension, the frustration of peering in the darkness with nothing in sight and just dark faith lighting the way - without this, our eyes of the heart will never unmask the powers abroad. Their name is legion today. If we do not do it for the world, who will? I close with these lines from Blake 'If the doors of perception were cleansed everything would appear to man as it is, infinite. For man has closed himself up, till he sees all things through the narrow chinks of his cavern.'

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"Where" and "when" were the words used in Luke this past week. The context being the return of Jesus. A context that we pray for daily in the words THY KINGDOM THY WILL BE DONE ON EARTH AS IT IS IN HEAVEN. The question becomes how well do I/we weave together the fabric of our lives that demonstrate



and reflect the attitudes of the Kingdom. We also appreciate Jesus's words 'the Kingdom is within you'. I suppose it comes to the question as to how well we are fashioned in our day to day in likeness to Jesus.

Our devotion to the

Sacred Heart of Jesus gives us a direction of sharing in the life and suffering of Jesus. One prayer that is associated with St. Margaret Mary Alacoque 'Remove from me all that can displease you or resist your holy will; let your pure love imprint your image so deeply upon my heart, that I shall never be able to forget you or be separated from you.' In John we read (18:26) "my kingdom is not of this world." What followed after His resurrection was the inauguration of the Kingdom and connected as well to our being consecrated in Baptism to be participants in that life which leads to and enables us to be participants in the Kingdom life. That might ask for a change of heart as well. Recalling too how conscious we may be of striking our hearts when we acknowledge the kind of changes we need to consider in representing the Kingdom life in our thoughts and words and actions. It may be true (perhaps the case) that certain rituals can become rote as a custom or habit. Interesting how the word "rote" comes from the latin rotarius which was also used to describe the rotation of a potters wheel. Remembering the song "Abba Father" and the words sharing that the Father is the potter and we are he clay. The attendant words asks to be molded and fashioned in the image of Jesus. May we appreciate how the Kingdom life is within us and among us. May our hearts be continually moved in the direction of those who hope to share completely in the life of the Kingdom when Jesus returns.

There is something about this time of year that makes me weary due to the desire to have Jesus return. The fall back from Daylight savings time, sunset coming earlier and I miss the daylight. But this year there is a kind of switch for me because I noticed that the manger scene that I keep near my front door stood out more for some reason. It is made of brass, nothing fancy, but how the light this year, going into this advent season seems to have a glow. As I said before about keeping the Manger scene up all year, it reminds me that comings and goings from home requires, as in the life of baptism, a daily renewal of movement outside my door. God is so loving that he sent his Son to us in one of the most vulnerable way of all, an infant. My going out the door reminds me that I will encounter all those I meet in vulnerable ways and my acts of kindness, my act of sharing the Holy Spirit working in my heart brings Christ to the world and brings light. These thoughts sort of come together when I started to think about St. Martin of Tours (the saint) and his sharing his cloak with a beggar in need. That cloak was all he had to share. I smile at the story because sometimes I feel like all I have to share is the tired of the day and the missing of light that is me. The light still shines in my house and outside of it too. I still see and wonder at all the light that comes into my world, that I see through faith and hope. As the daylight grows shorter, the wonders of God grow brighter. People who I got used to seeing in the sunlight are behind closed doors more because of the darkness and the cold but seeing them outside running between car and the house we wave say hi and might even stop and catch up for a minute. Those time are precious and bring light as we share the few minutes that cold, rain and snow allow. I noticed that as we walk toward one another in the cold for those few minutes we smile to each other as we check on each other. One of those neighbor's when asked how she is doing always says "I am blessed". That I am blessed always outshines my "I am fine" because it points out the difference between light and dark. She might be struggling but points out, God loves her and that makes her day well, that brings light to her world and mine. It is a shared cloak, and a reason my Manger scene might shine in the darkness at this time. Jesus came into the world to bring light and though the daylight might get shorter, the light Jesus brings to the world never dims, it shines brighter in the darkness. I smile writing this, it is a reminder that as a new season begins, the world turns as it should and I learn more about God's love, present even in the darkness if I so choose to look. I could get wrapped in the darkness and remain tired, but I do not. I gravitate toward the light of love and the shining reminder to take God with me out into the world. Even on dark days there is the light of Christ in my life and it burns bright.

2025 World day of Cloistered life
—Pro Orantibus Day (“For Those Who Pray”)—
Scheduled for November 21, 2025

Chicago, IL—Catholics throughout the world are encouraged to support the cloistered and monastic life on World day of Cloistered life, which is Friday, November 21, 2025, the Memorial of the Presentation of Mary in the Temple. “The primary purpose of World day of Cloistered life, traditionally known as

Pro Orantibus Day (“For Those Who Pray”), is to support—both spiritually and materially—the gift of the cloistered and monastic life,” notes Rev. Thomas Nelson, O.Praem., National Director of the institute on religious life. And as Pope Leo XIV reminds us, “the contemplative life is beautiful.” Pope Pius XII first instituted this ecclesial worldwide event in 1953 to publicly recognize women and men who so generously give of themselves to this unique calling and who each day, from the various convents and monasteries spread throughout the world, offer prayer and sacrifice unceasingly. Pope St. John Paul II later expanded its celebration and encouraged Catholics to highlight and support this hidden vocation in any way possible. This past July, 15th, Pope Leo visited the Poor Clare Monastery of the Immaculate Conception near his summer residence of Castel Gandolfo. Affirming the nuns in their sublime vocation, the Holy Father said: “The Vicar of Christ has an extreme need for your spiritual help and counts above all on you, who, by divine vocation, has chosen the better part, which is silence, prayer, contemplation, the exclusive love of God.” The nationwide effort to publicize World day of Cloistered life (Pro Orantibus Day) is coordinated by the institute on religious life.
