*Light on the Liturgy

The Liturgical Renewal, A Look Backward and a Look Forward

It has been almost 60 Years since the Second Vatican Council called the Church to a Liturgical Renewal. The Constitution on the Liturgy – officially called *Sacrosanctum Comcilium* (abbreviated “SC”) and published in 1963 - called for some significant external changes in the liturgy – especially compared to the manner in which the liturgy had been celebrated for the previous 400 years. This older rite, called the *Tridentine Liturgy*, was revised by the Council of Trent in the 16th Century.

We should note here that these external changes in the manner of celebrating liturgy actually flowed from a deeper and more ancient understanding of Church and sacraments than had been prevalent in Church thinking since the Middle Ages. The most significant of these changes were: a) a requirement for the full, active and conscious participation by all the faithful in the liturgical action, based on understanding the Church as a People, a community; b) the restoration of the Scriptures to a central place within the celebration c) calling for the liturgy to be celebrated in the vernacular, the language of the people, to better facilitate participation; d) moving the altar more to the center to better communicate the communal nature of the sacrament; and e) making the liturgy more flexible so that it could be adapted, within the guidelines set by the Church, to the needs of the particular culture in which the liturgy is celebrated.

These changes were not arbitrarily made, nor were they made at the whim of a few individuals. The decisions were made by a consensus of all of the bishops from throughout the world gathered at an *Ecumenical* (or *General*) *Council* – which, the Church has always taught, is guided by the Holy Spirit in its deliberations and decisions. Most of our fundamental, Christian beliefs were defined by a Council: for example, The 1st Ecumenical Council (Nicaea, 325) and the 2nd (Constantinople, 381) defined the doctrine of the Trinity; Nicaea (in the Nicene Creed which Christians use to this day) and Chalcedon (451) defined the humanity and Divinity of Jesus.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

In the Lectionary readings this past week we understood the final chapter in 2 Kings. What stayed with me was the pause in the rebuilding of the temple when they discovered the Book of



the Law. It was Josiah who came to the possession of the throne. He ordered the rebuilding of the temple (Solomon known for the building and David provided the materials). In the rebuilding of (some would say) the trashed worship space there was discovered the Book of Law. It was the prophetess Hulda who interpreted the scroll. That said, there was a reading of the law and, in a sense, a re-commitment to the content of what was read

aloud to the people. Part of the interpretation was to be careful about (what might amount to) faith practices and so to avoid evil and idolatry. Temple practice then was to encourage participation in the dictates and the law of Lord. When I was younger (pre-vatican days) I used to hear people speak of 'attending Mass'. I was part of the eventual movement from latin to the vernacular (english) and with my memory of Msgr. Gasbarre, it was a seamless development. It also came with the thought that not only do I attend Mass (as I used to serve the later morning Mass as Acolyte for three years) but I was to consciously participate in the liturgy. Liturgy is public worship and (we remember) a response to participate in a relationship with the Father and Son and Holy Spirit. I have read that the word liturgy also means 'work for the people' and I wonder how my/our participation is akin to the person of Jesus in service to others. It is a sincere question as the word 'content' might mean to be satisfied but as a people of God do we share the content of the presence of Christ within us? Do we have an appreciation of the One present to us in the liturgy of the Word and the liturgy of the Eucharist? Each time we celebrate and participate we have an opportunity to continue to build (sometimes to rebuild) a relationship with Christ and through Christ with one another. As those who partake of the meal of the Eucharist may we impart to others and share the sacred presence that we digest. May we, as well, continue to (borrowing from a title by one Shelby Steele I believe) build THE CONTENT OF OUR CHARACTER by seeking to develop the likeness of the One who shares His life with us.


From Bobbi Bugaj
