Ljght on the liturgy

The Liturgical Renewal, 16: Liturgical Ministers

There are two other changes to the liturgy introduced by Vatican II that flow from the nature of the Church as a community: The first is the diversity of ministries in the liturgy, including active lay ministries. (The second will be church design and architecture.) The existence of various ministries in the Church and their presence in the liturgy come from St. Paul's image of the Church as the Body of Christ. (See 7-17-22 article) Paul elaborates on this idea in I Cor. 12/4-31: "you are Christ's body...some people God has designated in the Church to be...apostles...teachers...gifts of healing...administration..." (see also Eph. 4/11-16; Rom.12/3-8). The Church is to work like the human body. Each member must do its part, not for personal gain or recognition, but to fulfill their ministry "for building up the Body of Christ" (Eph. 4/12).

Because the liturgy expresses the nature of the Church through signs and symbols, this same image applies to each liturgical celebration. The bishop's (and, by extension, the priest's) role in the Church is to be a leader and a unique sign of Christ, the head of the Body. In the liturgy, he is often referred to as the "Presider" to express this ministry and to distinguish his role from the other ministries. However, just as in the Church all of the members must exercise their gifts and ministries so that the whole Body can fulfill its mission, so too in the liturgy there is a diversity of ministries so that the liturgy would be celebrated as fully and effectively as possible.

Thus, the diversity of ministries in the liturgy (priest, deacon, reader, musician, minister of Communion, etc.) is not just an idea that some bishop at Vatican II invented, but it flows from the very nature of the Church. The proper exercise of these ministries is essential to the liturgy and to what the liturgy is meant to be and to do, just as all the parts of our body must work properly for our body to be healthy and to perform as it is meant to. This requires that each minister be acutely aware of this responsibility and thus prepare for and fulfill their roles accordingly. (cont. next week)

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

In celebrating the life of St. Faustina this past Wednesday, I learned a bit more about her life prior to entering the convent. She was much influenced by the practice of Eucharistic Devotion.



Time spent before the blessed sacrament. (I recalled how, during forty hours), we (Knights of the Altar) would be assigned times to pray before the presence of Christ. Two things about her movement towards the religious life gave me pause. The first was working as a housekeeper to support herself and her

parents. Later when she moved to Warsaw she approached a convent and eventually was accepted by the Sisters of Charity. The second (I need to apologize to the morning group last week. I had misread her working in the convent garden) she worked as a housemaid before she was accepted. Both point to the maintenance of the dwelling. It was only after her entrance into the convent that she worked in the garden being tasked with growing vegetables (among other things). Just prior to the Feast Day we celebrated Francis of Assisi. It was Francis who heard "go and repair my church". I wonder how often we consider what need be repaired in our own residences. By our own I mean repair and care within ourselves as Jesus is housed within us. How well do I/we keep house? How much consideration do I/we give to be servants of the one who dwells within us? Considering how St. Faustina was also tasked with fruit bearing in the garden, do I/we bear the fruits of the Holy Spirit as well? Through our baptismal identity we share in the priesthood and service of Christ. How well then do I/we bear the fruits (the kind of good soil we read of is needed) of patience and kindness and self-control and goodness? Faithfulness would be another and it was Bruno the founder of the Carthusians (also celebrated last week) who encouraged (this from the readings of the day) the prayerful disposition of 'seeking and finding and possessing' the presence of Christ. May we be disposed to the ordering of our lives in the direction of discipleship and service in Christ's name. May we use the tools of faith to cultivate the garden within our hearts to bear the fruits of holiness.
