1 John 2:3-11, Luke 2:22-35

Christ is born. Let us worship Him. The love of God has become tangible. The Son of God came among us to bring us salvation. St. Bernard puts it quite beautifully. "Our eyes were darkened, yet he dwells in light inaccessible, and lying paralyzed on our mats we could not reach the divine height. That is why our most gracious Savior and Healer of souls both descended from his lofty height and dimmed his brilliance for our weak eyes" (Sermons for Advent and Christmas, #9). God loves us so much, that He accommodates himself to our weakness. Through the mystery of the Incarnation God teaches us to empty ourselves of all attachments, and anything that keeps us from relying totally on Him. "Life passes, riches fly away, popularity is fickle, the senses decay, the world changes. One alone is true to us; One alone can be all things to us; One alone can supply our need" (John Henry Newman). God alone is enough. We can find the happiness he wants for us by letting him guide us, by being mindful of his loving presence.

When we ponder the Word of God in our hearts, the Word that became flesh in the womb of the Virgin Mary takes flesh in us. We conform ourselves to him by possessing obedient and loving faith. The Spirit that overshadowed the Blessed Virgin expresses itself in our acts of love and compassion towards others. Through us, God continues to seek out the lost who have a special claim on his loving compassion. Man is God's possession by virtue of his choice made in love. He expands our hearts so that his compassionate heart might love in ours. In his Christmas homily of 1964, St. Paul VI offered this exhortation. "May you know today how to lovingly cuddle your children. May you know today how to associate with a little extra charity for the poor, the suffering, the derelict, the young, and you will have a sincere Christmas, a regenerating Christmas, a happy Christmas" (Pope St. Paul VI).

Christmas teaches us that God did not look down upon us and pass us by but rather, He assumed our nature and our human condition, in all things but sin. When the Word became flesh, it was God's outrageous effort to be born among us and in our hearts. Jesus longs to be a light in each of our hearts. He knows about our darkness and wants to shine in our lives. We achieve the fulfillment of our destiny through the sincere gift of self, a gift that is made possible only through our encounter with God. Jesus, in the crib, shows us the way of tenderness to be close to each other, to be human.

Nativity Prayer of St. Bernard of Clairvaux

"Let your goodness Lord appear to us, that we, made in your image, may conform ourselves to it.

In our own strength, we cannot imitate your majesty, power, and wonder nor is it fitting for us to try. But your mercy reaches from the heavens through the clouds to the earth below.

You have come to us as a small child, but you have brought us the greatest of all gifts, the gift of eternal love. Caress us with your tiny hands, embrace us with your tiny arms, and pierce our hearts with your soft, sweet cries."

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

The celebration of the New Year comes with some challenges. Perhaps, as well, some thought about accountability relative to the One Jesus Christ born to us. The thought might prompt the question as to whether the arrangement of our lives are in keeping with the teachings of Jesus and living in His likeness. We appreciate that there will be a final reckoning and so (perhaps) a summing up of our lives as we are told that we will render an account. How well have we delivered and handed on the one born to us as well



as born in us at baptism. The Latin "educare" give us the idea of being schooled and with that being led out of ignorance into knowledge. How is it that we sometimes forget that we are challenged to be lifelong learners? Do we seek to gain knowledge in the cultivation of the life and teachings of Jesus continually?

To seek to cultivate and improve in the teachings of Our Savior? The word "amelioration" has the direction of becoming better and more practiced. Perhaps a good intention for consideration in our day to day. Intent has to do with our hearts and our minds to be attentive to a direction of life as those who practice the Way and the Truth and the Life. Is it our intention to continue to learn and be trained in the way of discipleship and to daily improve in likeness to Jesus. Our ritual action prior to listening to the Gospel is to sign our foreheads and lips and heart with the sign of the cross. A liturgical gesture with the motion of our hand. The prayer "May the Lord be in my mind, on my lips and in my heart" is said prior to hearing the Gospel. Appreciating (in a sense) our thoughts and our manner of speaking and our feelings, we may ask whether they are in accord with as well as in harmony and agreement with the One we digest later in our celebration. It was St Paul the VI who wrote that Nazareth is the school in which we begin to understand the life of Jesus. It is the school of the Gospel. Here we to learn to observe, to listen, to meditate and to penetrate the mysterious meaning of the manifestation of the Son of God. May we continue to be directed on the path of salvation as we await His return and be reckoned as those on His right. As we read in Matthew 25

From Bobbi Bugaj

As a constant in my life is that God affords me the opportunity to meditate on multiple things. This week, Tuesday, January 6, St. Andre Bessette was the Saint of the day. I love reflecting on his life. He was a Holy Cross Brother and his ministries was porter, an infirmarian and a janitor. (First canonized Canadian born Saint.) Mostly, a porter. His job was to welcome the people at the door. This Sunday is the Baptism of the Lord and the reading stops at the line "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." The final line in Tuesday evening prayer reading was "By this favor you were saved." There is another translation which uses the word "grace" but I explained to the group Tuesday night that I was struck by the word "favor" because I like the definition of "an act of kindness beyond what is due or usual." And sometimes that is how I can treat my response to grace. It seems to me that 'favor' can sometimes leave out God's love and I can treat 'favor' as a little less than love. That is not what God does, and that is why the word stuck with me. See, I am an adopted child of God through baptism. I am washed clean of original sin and asked to walk in the footsteps of Jesus. My adoption is not based on perfection or success it is based on me, where I stand and who I am. I am a child of God's love. I am asked to bring that out into the world. To be a porter is opening the door to prayer, healing and compassion. Opening the door requires me to action but that action does not require me to be something I am not. It requires me to be just me but listening to the nudges of the Holy Spirit so as to carry out the path that walks in the footsteps of Jesus. That is why the word favor stuck with me. God responds in Grace, but I have to watch that I respond to God's love with love and not anything less than love. Not as a whim but a response of love. Like Andre Bessette, I am asked to open the door with the love of Christ. To listen in love and compassion to all who ask to enter my life of Christ and respond accordingly. My response asks me to be an infirmarian, and that means prayers of healing, mercy and compassion for this person. I answer the door in piety and humility. I think of my Baptismal promises many times throughout the year but especially at Mass when praying either of the Creeds starting with "I believe." Because in stating "I believe", I am also renouncing something. If "I believe in God," I am renouncing Satan. I am opening the door to the world with God. These thoughts, ponderings or meditations bring hope and healing in my life. This week again brings clarity to what being a "child of God means." A restoring of what the porter at the door means and how I respond to the Grace of God. I know that "favor" in the reading is God's grace, but the thought that I can respond to it as less is something I need to work and that thought is restoring. Faith is not a linear journey, but a winding path and the clarity of the words in this week's Gospel was insight into something I may have temporarily forgot. It asks the question, is God "well pleased" with me?


MONTHLY BIBLE STUDY GROUP


