# Light on the Liturgy

#### 3rd Sunday of Easter: The Law of Love


If we say, as we have, that it is in the Gospels that we will find the explanation of what it means to live according to God's Way, according to the Christian moral code - so as to be faithful followers of Christ and members of his Kingdom - this leaves us with a bit of a dilemma. Where do the 10 Commandments fit in - since their origin is the Old Testament not the New? (See Exodus 20/1-17 and Deuteronomy 5/6-21; See also the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, Nos. 2051-2082.) As such, they are certainly part of God's revelation and have served as the basis, the foundation, of how we are to live, at least since the time of St. Augustine (d. 430 AD).

Actually, nothing has changed. The 10 Commandments are still the basics of a Christian moral code, but Christ calls us to a higher standard - a standard based on the Commandments, but taking us to another level of living where we act not to follow laws but to follow his example and teachings because we love God and our neighbor as ourselves. When the rich young man approached Jesus and asked, "What good must I do to gain eternal life?" Jesus listed for him the Commandments related to how we live with other people (Nos. 4-8). "All these I have observed." Then Jesus calls him to a higher level of commitment and self-denial (Matt. 19/16-21). A little later in Matthew's Gospel, when Jesus is asked to summarize the Law, he clarifies what this new level is by giving us the New Law, the Law of Love: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart...This is the greatest and first commandment. The second is like it: you shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22/37-40). Finally, during the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus points out that this higher level is to strive to live according to the example of the life of God, a life of love, when he says, "So be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matt. 5/48).

On a practical level, this means that the Commandments are the ground, the foundation upon which we walk; but Jesus calls us to look to the heavens where we find, and live according to, God's Way. He has said, "I have not come to abolish [the law and the prophets] but to fulfill" (Matt. 5/17). (cont. next week)

# FROM The PASTOR'S DESK

So much of what was in the week's daily readings seemed to accord with the last few minutes of the solar eclipse this past Monday. For one, the movement from darkness into light. I understood that there would be a



time of darkness and it happened very quickly (to my thinking or expectation) and it gave me some pause to consider how much I (perhaps we) are in accord (the word itself deriving from the heart) in harmony with the light of Christ who banished the darkness of sin. The eclipse I have read is the obscuration of the light of the sun. An act of darkening and be-

ing made dark. The gospel reading was inclusive of the conversation with Nicodemus who came to Jesus in the dark (night). We recall too that Jesus gradually brought Nicodemus and others into the knowledge of who he was as sent by the Father. At the Easter Vigil and in the early darkness the fire was blessed and from the Easter fire the Paschal Candle was lit. The same candle that would be used for Baptisms and also lit again at Funeral Masses. The ritual prayer being "God our Father source of light, bless this candle and make it holy. Through its presence among us may the light of Christ, risen in glory, dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds." The procession into church anticipated the Exultet and the words sung " the light of Christ" with the response "thanks be to God". As often as the candle is used during this season of Easter I wonder if it might be a reminder to appreciate whether there is any darkness that needs be removed from our own hearts and minds. Asking, perhaps, as to whether or not we are seeking to reflect the light and knowledge of the presence of Christ within us. As attentive as many of us were to the event of last Monday may we too be attentive to that which might obscure the presence of the light of Christ within us. May we seek to be faithful to the gradual development into our own baptismal identity where we hear the words, as the candle is presented, "receive the light of Christ" and the admonition to walk as a child of the light.

# From Bobbi Bugaj

There are times when planning ahead for the future that the Holy Spirit directs takes me in an unlikely direction. For the last two weeks and in the next few weeks our Tuesday Evening Prayer is 1 Peter 2:4-5. It is about building stones. I find stones an odd image for life. There doesn't seem to be anything less living than a stone; but a stone has properties that I don't usually think about, they are constantly changing, constantly being part of God's plan. Through melting, erosion, sedimentation, and metamorphosis, rocks are continuously created, altered, but not destroyed, they may become small rocks but not destroyed. So, even though they may seem like they do nothing, they are constantly in some kind of flux. In being changed into smaller rocks or a sand like substance is to be changed again into new. They can be reformed into something new, I am constantly changing, I am constantly being recreated to what Christ is forming me to be, and even when it looks like I could be falling apart, I am just being reshaped into Christ. I am rejuvenated into a person that shows Christ alive in the world. I am being formed into the image of Christ on a transformation to eternal life. I am constantly being formed and renewed. Did you know that some rocks float? While I am not sure that I have ever seen that, the thought came to mind of my baptismal promises and how they keep me afloat when there are times I feel like I could be under water. Rocks underwater continue to be formed too. The full reading is: "Come to the Lord, a living stone, rejected by men but approved, nonetheless, and precious in God's eyes. You too are living stones, built as an edifice of spirit, into a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." With Christ as my rock, I am able to withstand heavy loads of life. Not easily moved if that is what Christ needs me to be and formed into roads, foundations, walls or a My formation by Christ being renewed, garden. restored, rejuvenated means that I am open to being alive with Christ and even though I may seem like a rock. I am a rock not an island that is alive in Christ. Constantly changing into what Christ wants me to be, the image of Him.
