Philemon 7-20, Luke 17: 20-25

"I do not think it an overstatement to say that the purpose of life is to love whoever is around to be loved" (Kurt Vonnegut, Sirens of Titan, pg. 253). God is love and He made us in his image and likeness. God also makes the rain fall on the good and the bad alike. Being made in the image and likeness of God, we are to love always and to love everyone. Having been made in the image of the farmer who sows seed with abandon, we are to spread the love lavishly, not choosing who is to receive it. Saint Paul found great joy in all the good Philemon did. By conforming our hearts to the heart of Christ, we become sources of hope for those in need.

We can give love because we have received love from God. He has made us stewards of his loving kindness toward all we meet. We have been created in the image and likeness of our loving Father and we insult him whenever we are miserly in extending love and compassion toward others. The Beloved Son poured himself out for our salvation. Having been made in his image and likeness, we should pour ourselves out making his salvation known to the world. Everything we have is a gift from him, so what have we to lose? If we squander on others what he has squandered on us, we are only taking after our prodigal Father. He grants deliverance to captives. He breaks the chains of sin. He opens the eyes of the blind. He feeds with the bread of life those who hunger and thirst for salvation. He is the constant companion of the poor. He shows mercy to the lost. All the Father has done through the Son, He wants to continue doing through us. "For God, who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness,' made his light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ" (2 Cor.4:6). Through Baptism, we have been grafted to Christ. Because Christ lives in us, the Kingdom of God is among us. God has pitched his tent in our hearts and abides with us just as he abided with His only begotten Son. Christ who is nearest to the Father's heart desires to set our hearts ablaze with the Fire of Divine Love. Because of the glory shining on His face, we can radiate his light to the world.

Because the Kingdom of heaven is at hand, the people who walk in the valley of darkness have seen a great light. When Christ stretched out his arms in the everlasting sign of love, the fire of divine love vanquished the realm of darkness and death forever.

"We are living at a time when humanity, connected as never before, appears much more divided than united... we continue to find ourselves on the brink of a delicate precipice and we do not want to fall... We appear to be witnessing a dramatic and childlike scenario: in the garden of humanity, instead of cultivating our surroundings, we are playing instead with fire, missiles and bombs, weapons that bring sorrow and death, covering our common home with ashes and hatred... let us open our hearts to our brothers and sisters; let us press forward on the journey towards greater knowledge and understanding of one another. Let us strengthen the bonds between us, without duplicity or fear, in the name of the Creator who has put us together in this world as guardians of our brothers and sisters. So that, together, we may be prophets of community, artisans of unity, and builders of peace" (Pope Francis in Bahrain).

## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

There was at one time an association with funeral liturgies and the Dies Irae. So translated the "day of wrath." At the liturgy with the St. Benedict Community I had mentioned the word "metanoia." That would indicate a change of mind or conversion or repentance. Perhaps atonement, as well with the thought of being in harmony and agreement with the way of Jesus. I had mentioned that in relationship with the reading from the prophet Zephaniah (seldom used in our liturgy)



whose name may be translated (I have read) as "the watchman of the Lord." "Metanoia" also has some play with a change of heart. The anticipation of the day of wrath (the last judgment) may be a day we do not often consider. The question becomes am: I ready for the return of the Lord as avidly as some are of celebrating the first coming of the Lord at Christmas. One of the verses of the sequence reads 'the written book will be brought forth, in which all is contained from which the world shall be judged.'

We read in Malachi

"Behold, I will send my messenger, and he will prepare the way before me." that would be (to our manner of believing) the messenger identified by Jesus in Matthew 11:10. As we recalled last weekend that would be John the Baptist. Whose message was one of repentance and preparation for the way of the Lord which was a fulfillment of the Prophet Isaiah (40:3). The Gospel shared with the children were about the two who were asked by their father to work in the field. The first said no but later changed and went to work in the field.

The second said yes but was a no show. The first, perhaps, an example of repentance and following the will of the father while the second a kind of distance between the agreement to go and not showing up (so to speak). I suppose with so much transpiring over the next few days and preparations being made and expectations being formed by those close to us it may be a challenge to appreciate what the first coming promises that is His final coming. May we seek to prepare as well mindful of our agreement to work in the field of the world we live in and seek to transmit the sacred presence that we celebrate and await His return.


## From Bobbi Bugaj

For the four weeks of Advent Wednesday night's evening prayer readings were taken from 1<sup>st</sup> Thessalonians 5:19-24.

It starts out very interestingly: "Do not stifle the Spirit. Do not despise prophecies. Test everything; retain what is good." I could use these words each of my life. I smiled at the word "stifle" because in dictionary.com they define it as the word means "to quell, crush or end by force." Yeah, I may or may not admit to my actions, words and thoughts that bring me to stumble on the path that I walk. I think of Isaiah words "a voice cries out in the wilderness" and think of the wilderness. The wilderness that can be my prayer life, or the wilderness that comes when actions or words hurt another. Wilderness can look like my not seeing the forest for the trees. Then I think of the prophet Isaiah's words during the different weeks of Advent and I see the lighted candles. I do not wish to quell, crush or end by force the love of God nor do I wish to do that to others. God lights my way, he lights the love so that I can see it and follow it ever hour of every day. Over time I have learned not to stifle it and let the Spirit lead and I smiled at another thought.... have I taken those lights out of the church with me every week so as to shine Faith, Peace, Joy and Love to world before walking in for Christmas?
