

Coninued from last weeks bulletin....

What does all this say to us? In our prayers, petitions, in our needs and concerns, as men and women of faith, we, too, cry out, "Jesus, Master, have pity on us - hear my concern, Be present to my need" These are not trivial things - about health, forgiveness, mercy, ours and the future of our loved ones and of others, peace in our world so divided, so wounded by violence. The list is long and serious. And often there seems to be no answer; doesn't God who is mercy care? Where are you, Lord? The question is heard in the psalms; Psalm 55 begins with - "O God, listen to my prayer, do not hide from my pleading, attend to me and reply; with my cares I cannot rest!" Has that thought, question ever arisen in your heart? Perhaps you've shared it with another and perhaps, you've held it in your heart - fearful that you even thought it. God always hears our prayers and His response, answer comes in different ways according to His wisdom - sometimes it comes immediately, often in time when we least expect it as we wait and perhaps, the answer will come only in Eternal Life. In the meantime, as we wait, as we hope and pray, there is a prayer as we wait: "Lord, what do You want to teach me, what do I need to learn about You, about myself, about my relationship in faith with You? And perhaps, we might hear in our hearts; "Trust Me! Do not give up! Remain steadfast in your faith, faith is always a gift as is trust. You are not forgotten!" Where trust is lacking, there is always the darkness of self-pity, of despair, of hopelessness lurking - all of which are a kind of prison with no parole. To trust is never a small thing - It is a kind of surrender, never a surrender of defeat rather a surrender of self into God's embrace. The bottom line is: Is God's embrace, is His presence to you, me important? Do I desire to trust? Living trust, living faith in daily life is not always easy. For all of us, whatever our vocation, there is struggle, there is challenge, doubts arise because we are human. Some struggles are trivial and a waste of time and some are not and are worth the effort. The struggle of coming to deeper faith and more profound truth is worth the struggle because of the reward, the greatest reward that no one can take from us.: Life on high in God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

At the close of a year there is an adage or a common saying in Italian which is "Bon Fini Bon Principio" which translates "Good endings and Good Beginnings." Some would say that the adage has to do with preparation and intention. For some, it may be a familiar saying and much like sayings that are easily spoken (for example "Thanks be to God" at the end of our liturgy which is the response to "Go in the Peace of Christ") it might be good to appreciate how the year is ending as well as intentions for new beginnings respectful of our baptismal identity. Am I/we ending the year as those responsive to the word made flesh born to us at His first coming? Fair question. Am I/we conscious of and attentive to the reason for the coming of Jesus to dwell among us? Have I/we formed intentions for the beginning of the New Year



that might enhance and increase our consciousness of the One who dwells within us? It was our Blessed Mother who in Luke's Gospel proclaimed "My Soul Magnifies the Lord." We appreciate that this is in the context of visiting Elizabeth. What was acknowledged by Elizabeth (through the response of the Baptist within her) came a question 'who am that the mother of my Lord should come to me?' The question echoed the question of King David about the Ark of the Covenant coming to him (that would be 2 Samuel). What needs to be noted is that ark or tabernacle represented the presence of God as it was carried during their pilgrimage. Our Blessed Mother was tabernacled with the presence of God through her acceptance of her role in the history of salvation. Come to think of it, we too are tabernacled with the same presence as those baptized and those who nourished by His Body and Blood as well as His teaching. Reflecting on the past year perhaps (just a thought) to consider how we/I have grown and developed in the fostering of that presence that might increase and elevate His presence through people like ourselves. May we be conscious of a continual development in His way and as those who await His next coming. May we represent His presence and ask for the intercession of Our Blessed Mother and seek to be blessed as she was acknowledged as Blessed among women.

Approaching up to this Feast of the Epiphany, I gave some thought how my journey of discipleship was this year. The magi followed the star, the shining light direction in the dark. I thought of all the times in this journey of life that can seem like there is more darkness than light, how the light brings hope and faith and direction. Some of the choices life asks us to make can seem very confusing like I am walking in a dark room where I cannot find the light switch. It is only when I stop take a deep breath and say, maybe I need to stop for a moment, pray, and by doing so, stop the distractions, then I can look up to see the light. It's always there, the Spirit leads but I forget to look, really look, at where the journey in the dark is taking me. The light of Jesus is steady and healing. The journey is light and healing. It requires a response on my part, the response to follow, the response is to give the gift of myself 100%. All of myself includes the gifts I have, but also those things that I might not be so good at, that requires healing of myself so that I can ask for help of others. I do not walk this journey alone, I am led by the Spirit who guides me forward. Like the magi, I may have to stop and ask directions. (Confession is a great way to get back on track.) In following the Light of Christ, I find, I am not afraid of the dark, I am not afraid of the journey, I even see the need to return home by a different path, in walking the footstep of Jesus. The light gives me the ability to show compassion and mercy because I do not fear the darkness. I find faith in hope and have the ability to walk a little bit more every day. I am also able to share this light, this path, this giving of myself with others in the hopes that they too see the Light of Christ in this world. As the days grow longer at this time of year, slowly maybe a minute at a time, I am reminded that every minute of sharing that light means something to me. It can be in a smile, a laugh or even a sigh. It can be a door held for someone or picking up something dropped for someone else. In His light I learn kindness and receive healing one minute at a time. On this journey of following Jesus' light, I am sometimes required to return home a different way. To change a direction that might not be very good for me. That is ok too. I will meet new people and they will share their light of Christ with me. It is in seeing the light of Christ, acknowledging the journey will be different if I so choose to go down the path, and the peace and healing that comes with that choice, brings a smile. I get to lay the gift of myself to God, follow the light that is healing, restoring and rejuvenating and breaks the darkness of life. It is joyful and a reminder of what He gives me every day. There is no darkness in this path, just everlasting life.
