Continued from last weeks bulletin.....

“Be what you is.” What are we? “The people God loves and has chosen to be his very own who must clothe themselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience” (Col. 3:12). “Don’t be what you ain’t” We are challenged to be authentic, not artificial or phony. Jesus made the point when he said, “Each tree is recognized by its fruit. People do not pick figs from thornbushes or grapes from briars” (Lk. 6:44). If we cooperate with the movement of the Spirit, we can have the attitude and mindset of Christ who stripped himself of all his divine privileges and clothed himself in the abject lowliness of a slave. More than that, he stripped himself of every pretext of human dignity and freely embraced the degradation of the cross. Faithful to his mission, he loved those who were his own to the end (CF. Phil 2:5-7). We are to be faithful because He is always faithful. While its grammar may hurt sensitive ears, Dr. Davis’s closing remark is most appropriate. “If you ain’t what you is, then you is what you ain’t”

Through baptism, Christ who clothed himself with our humanity has clothed us with his divinity. As members of Christ, we are to proclaim the truth to all we meet. Having been grafted to the Incarnate Word, we have been made instruments whereby the Seed of the Word is scattered and planted in every human heart. The Spirit of God at work in us can produce a harvest of love. We share what our hands have touched, and our eyes have seen with the people Christ loves and has purchased as his own. What we believe influences how we live and relate to others. Truth and love lead us to communion with God and strengthen the bond of love between us and other people. When we listen to another person’s story and accompany the individual on this/her journey, we make God’s love and compassion real and tangible. For this to happen, we need to lead lives worthy of our Christian calling (CF. Eph. 4:1). Think of it this way: love shapes truth into words and actions that are humble and kind; and truth shapes how we show love.

The Psalmist wrote, “Know that the Lord is God. It is he who made us and not we ourselves. We belong to him. We are his people and the sheep of his pasture” (Ps. 100:3). All things were created by him according to his good pleasure, for his praise and glory. His involvement did not stop with creation. Not only were all things created by him, but by his all-powerful word, they are continually kept in existence. As the Word Incarnate, Christ is the image of the invisible God. Out of his boundless love for us, he manifested the fullness of the Godhead and the infinite loving-kindness of the Father. Through the mystery of the Incarnation, he reconciled us to the Father by uniting our human nature to himself with unbreakable bonds of love. As images of Christ, we are challenged to make the Father’s love visible and tangible for all who are in distress and need.

In imitation of Pope Francis who closed his Apostolic Letter, *Desiderio Desideravi* with a prayer from St. Francis, I will close this reflection with a few lines from that same prayer.

O sublime humility! The Lord of the universe, God and the Son of God, so humbles Himself that He hides Himself for our salvation under an ordinary piece of bread! See the humility of God, brothers, and pour out your hearts before Him. Humble yourselves

That you may be exalted by Him. Hold back nothing of yourselves for yourselves, that He Who gives Himself totally to you may receive you totally!

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

There are still repairs being made to homes in our neighborhood and beyond. We still await needed repair both in the school as well as the priest's residence. It is a patient process as we move forward this summer. As we await the beginning of the repair and the restoration and putting back into order of the buildings I think too of how that might prompt a thought about the



condition of the One who is housed within each one of us as temples of the Holy Spirit. Perhaps a question of repair or maintenance or even restoration. How might we seek to improve and increase the One we digest at communion?

A communion that implies a participation and a sharing of the presence of the One we house and who dwells within us. We may say that we house the One that occupies our minds and lips and hearts. Perhaps a question of possession as well as we sing "Come Holy Ghost Creator Blest and in our Hearts take up thy rest" which concludes with seeking to fill our hearts with His presence. Inasmuch as the heart circulates blood we may consider how well we circulate a flow of life that is derived from our participation in the sacramental life of the Church. The word "amelioration" is from the French meaning 'making or becoming better' as well as repair and improve. Again a question of how well we seek to improve and repair the temples of our bodies dedicated to the service of the Father and Son and Holy Spirit. Jesus offers us a template as well as a pattern to be appreciated as He dwells within us. Thinking back to the houses under repair and the sounds of the workers hammering as well as other sounds that distract just may encourage thinking about the kind of repair and improvement that is unique to each of one of us. May we construct and put together the kind of presence given us sacramentally.

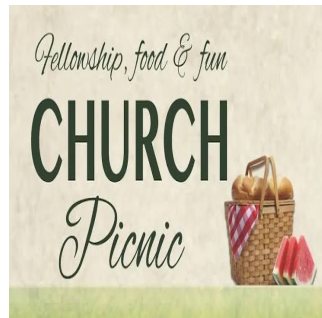
From Bobbi Bugaj

The Liturgy of the Hours has many benefits for me. Over time the psalms and sacred readings have pointed in directions where I need to grow, have to grow and how I have grown. I pointed out at my evening prayer reflection after I read Romans 3:21-26, that I kind of fear the weeks when this reading comes around.

St. Paul is a great writer. He has a way with words and every time I read this passage, I start with "ok, now what." But here is the truth. When in prayer, I arrive as I am. Could be tired or could be joyful. I bring only two of the same things with me every day, the breathing and my presence. (God is always present.) My presence has to make God laugh because being human, presence can be physical but not mentally, meaning my heart could be somewhere else. This is something that I work on. When I am just there, it takes me a while to be all there. Sometimes I do not get there at all and together we will try later. Overtime, meaning over years, I have been able to be better in presence and learned how to combat distractions. It took me a while, no lying here. Back to Romans, it talks about faith in Jesus, it talks about sin depriving us of the glory of God, and redemption through the blood of Jesus. This week I started to meditate on a kingdom of sin and death and a kingdom of the grace of God. As always, where I am at, is a reflection of me, right here, right now and God leads me but I am not always sure where. For not the first time, I look up "expiation" and the definitions I found were wonderful. One) the act of making amends or showing you are sorry for a wrong doing. Two) to cover or cleanse sin- restore to purity. I immediately notice that now where in these two definitions it states that it was done by the wrong doer. In Romans, St. Paul states God did it for us even though we sinned. I know when I just pause on this thought I go to the "Am I worthy?" And then I remember how many times I have said those words at Communion Rite. "Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed." I love those words, I have faith in those words and I hang on to those words that mean so much to me right before communion. Now I smile. St. Paul does not seem so confusing today. His words ask me to look at my life and my prayer time and my many changes of heart and said, "you know that it is all just the same question, where is your heart." Which was great because right after evening prayer is Mass. So, I read Roman's, I prayed about Romans (kind of being afraid) and then I went to Mass with a change of heart. With the thought St. Paul wanted me and the Roman's to reflect on where my heart is today and am I on a path that believes in Jesus Christ. I love this path, with certain readings, I can be tentatively afraid, but then I find they comfort me. I shared some of these thoughts at Evening Prayer, some I just held in my heart. In both instances, I changed. I am happy, healed and comforted in those times where St. Paul makes me pause. It is in the pause that my heart can change.
