2 Kings 2: 1, 6-14, Matthew 6: 1-6, 16-18

In Chapter Four of the Rule, Saint Benedict tells his monks, "Yearn for everlasting life with holy desire. Day by day remind yourself that you are going to die" (RB 4.46-47). Today's first reading offers us a wonderful example of accompaniment in the dying process. Elijah is preparing to depart from this world and Elisha refuses to abandon him. "As the Lord lives, and as you live, I will not leave you" (2 Kings 2:2). Human mortality is messy. The death process is distressing and frightful. No one should be left to go it alone. I was with my mom as she entered the final stages of her life. I remember asking her if she had any fears. Her answer was simple and to the point. "I have never done this before." As I listened to her, I was overwhelmed by the realization that I was about to lose the woman who was not only my mother but who had also become my best friend and confidante. Reminiscent of Elisha's pledge, "I will not leave you," I told my mother that I would be with her as far as the door and that dad and the rest of her deceased loved ones would escort her across the threshold into the presence of the King. No one should face death alone.

Elijah mounted the fiery chariot alone, but the affection offered by his devoted disciple must have been a great support. The isolation we have endured as a result of the pandemic has made some of us more aware of our need for human contact and interaction. Many of us are dealing with unresolved grief stemming from the fact that we were not able to be with a loved one at the time of his or her death or attend the funeral. Elijah's journey to the river Jordan is an illustration of the long journey we must be willing to take passing from isolation to communion. As the anxiety and threats of COVID recede, we must be willing to journey out of the darkness into the light of day. Having been forced into isolation, we need to discover a way of developing healthy and life-giving relationships. We have to be willing to dream dreams and envision a better society. Through faith in Christ, we can become caring human beings.

"The truth is that only in the mystery of the incarnate Word does the mystery of man take on light. For Adam, the first man was a figure of Him Who was to come, (20) namely Christ the Lord. Christ, the final Adam, by the revelation of the mystery of the Father and His love, fully reveals man to man himself and makes his supreme calling clear... He Who is "the image of the invisible God" (Col. 1:15), (21) is Himself the perfect man. To the sons of Adam, He restores the divine likeness which had been disfigured from the first sin onward" (Gaudium et Spes, #22).

Instead of yielding to impatience or despondency in the face of overwhelming challenges, we should turn our thoughts to the goodness of the Lord towards those who trust in Him. I love you Jesus, my love. Fill my heart with faith, hope, and charity. Help me never sin again. Grant that I might love you always and then do with me what you will.

FROM The PASTOR'S DESK

"Decrease" and "increase" were words that were connected as we celebrated the Feast of the Birth of John the Baptist. I believe that it was St. Augustine who offered the thought that the chosen date (24 June) coincided with the summer solstice when day light begins to shorten. The winter solstice begins the reversal when daylight begins to lengthen again. Decrease and increase as the Baptist witnesses to questions about Jesus with the words I AM NOT THE MESSIAH: I AM SENT



BEFORE HIM and what follows in John 3:30 HE MUST INCREASE WHILE I MUST DECREASE. John then anticipated the Light of the World who came to banish the Darkness. I suppose it is about movement and direction. The reflection perhaps being how well do I acknowledge the lessening of the light of Christ in my day to day? How well to I anticipate the coming of the light of Christ at His birth. Do I seek to go from darkness to light with intention?

The Latin would be 'ex tenebris ad lucem.' It is a direction of movement through life that decreases that which does not reflect the imitation of Jesus and seeks to increase the light and knowledge of His Way. With the daylight beginning to decrease we may have the prayerful opportunity to examine areas of our lives that diminish the light. Anticipating the birth (perhaps too early for some) over the next six months we may be challenged to increase in the light which makes us more visible as those who have the desire to grow in greater likeness to Jesus Himself. Seasonal changes apart there is the opportunity to use the times and seasons to uproot that which is contrary to the light and show that which is the seed that is planted in good soil. I recall a story about a traveler and his shadow as the sun was shining while on his way. The devil appeared from behind a tree and asked if he could purchase his shadow. The man mused that he did not need the shadow and accepted the money. Once accepted he simply disappeared. End of story. May we use the time in between the celebrations of the birth of John the Baptist and Our Lord Jesus to be conscious of the dark areas of our lives and be brought into the light and knowledge of Jesus through seeking His way and truth and life. May we be conscious as well of the snares of the evil one and be free of any attitude that neglects growing in His way.

From Bobbi Bugaj

This past Thursday morning as I was having coffee on our deck, I looked up and into the eyes of a deer in my neighbor's yard. We just kind of looked at one another, acknowledging that we were both present and then the deer took a step back and jumped over the fence to go on with its day. The deer had places to go and things to do. I also noticed that when looking at me, it did not panic just looked. I felt like we both said "Good morning" to each other. Then I thought of the yards in the neighborhood. All our yards are fenced with fourfoot fences. It creates obstacles to walk from one yard to the other. You have to walk to a gate and open it to get to the next yard. When I talk to neighbors in the back yard, we meet at the fence and talk over it. If I want, I need to go out my gate and into their gate to be in the same space. This brought me to a pondering of obstacles in life and how I navigate them. To be a good neighbor, I really do not have to jump over the fence, I can just go up to it and talk. To be a presence in their life, to listen and catch up. If help is needed the gates are there, they both open and close, both of us, have the option to open them. I thought of the graces of the backyard. How God gives us the ability to reach out to others where we are at. To acknowledge a mission of saying hello and reaching a neighbor where they are at. If help is needed one must simply open a way, not once but twice to leave my spot to get to theirs, to offer more than just moral support. I have noticed sometimes that when my neighbor and I are done and I walk out the gates, we both sometimes leave the gates open. How I got to this meditation on life is that Tuesday was the birth of John the Baptist. A voice in the desert and a call to repentance. Saying that he must decrease as Jesus increases. He opened a gate to Jesus and let us walk in. While the deer can jump the fence to come or go, I get the invitation but to accept I have to make the decision to leave one place to go to another. In that invitation I get to participate in the world around me without obstacles. I get to be missioned into the world and in return I can acknowledge all the graces that go with that. To see the image of God in all, even if it is just over the fence, brings in the longing of walking around to the gate and entering. I open the gate and then my neighbor opens the gate. I leave one place to enter another place to be a servant of God. It does not take much, it just takes reaching out to another. In the reaching out, fences do not become an obstacle, they become a journey to Christ. In those few moments on Thursday morning, I got a lesson in what is and what is not an obstacle to Christ, that is nothing.
