***Light on the liturgy*

The Liturgical Renewal, 15: The Church and Changes in the Liturgy

The idea of meeting Christ in the liturgy brings us back to our discussion of the liturgical changes based on the nature of the Church as community. Since we are all, lay and ordained, members of the Church and share the responsibility for the Church's mission and because the way the liturgy is celebrated should express the nature of the Church, there can be no passive spectators in the liturgy. We are called to a "fully conscious, and active participation." We do not "attend Mass." That is a totally inappropriate phrase because we do not come to watch someone else (the priest) do something while we look on, like watching television. In the liturgy, we are not the audience, but part of the cast. We cannot simply attend Mass; but, as baptized members of the Church, we *participate* in the Mass.

Our participation, internal and external, is an integral part of meeting Christ in the liturgy. Just like a human relationship, meeting Christ in the liturgy requires both parties to be actively involved. He is present there through various signs and symbols - in the proclamation of the Word, in the ministry of the bishop or priest, in a unique way under the appearance of bread and wine, and finally in the community. This points out again the critical importance of celebrating the liturgy well and of all the ministers fulfilling their roles as well as possible.

However, we must do our part to meet Christ half-way. Before Mass, we could take a few minutes to reflect on what is about to happen. We believe that Christ and his redemptive work will be sacramentally present in the celebration of the Eucharist. We need to take that seriously; God's great saving action will be here for us. Our response can only be awe and thanksgiving. When the Scripture readings are proclaimed, we need to listen attentively - with the question, "how does this apply to my life?" As we join in the singing, listen to the hymns and other sung parts. If they are chosen thoughtfully, they can speak to us of God's great works and of his presence in our midst. Above all, pray and sing aloud because that says to the other members of the community, "This is for real," and provides a message that Christ is here and makes a difference. (cont. next week)

## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

One of the takeaways of the Feast of the Archangels has to do with their names and our capacity for imitation. Michael,



Gabriel and Raphael. In the past whenever I became aware of folks who were visiting Rome I would offer a contact (recently retired Monsignor who moved back to the United States this summer) for a

tour of Maria Maggiore. It was at this basilica that an artist named Jacopo Torriti decorated the apse walls with scenes from the life of our Blessed Mother. It was in the Visitation mosaic that the angel Gabriel is depicted with wings and feet. Familiar to us all. The basilica was built after the Lateran council which declared Mary as Theotokos or 'Mother of God'. Another artist also depicted the Annunciation with a similar angelic presence, wings and feet. St. Gregory the Great once offered that "you should beware that the word 'angel' denotes a function rather than a nature. These holy spirits of heaven have indeed always been spirits". To that degree, they delivered messages. It is something of a challenge to see the three as more than representations of winged and having feet. Perhaps more important is how we appreciate the capacity we have to appreciate their names. Michael means WHO IS LIKE GOD. By virtue of our baptism we share in the priesthood of Christ. We have the capacity to live like Jesus, our Lord and our God. Gabriel gives us GOD IS MY STRENGTH. Interesting how prior to the Visitation of Mary there was the encounter with Zechariah. It was Mary that responded in a manner that she received the Holy Spirit and so Christ taking flesh within her. We too have the capacity to seek and exercise the strength given us as those who share in our meal of the Eucharist. The name Raphael (depending on who you read) God's REMEDY or GOD HAS HEALED gives us the capacity to be the type of sojourners in our world who are the kind of company that seeks remedy and healing in our culture and society. May the messages of the archangels increase our capacity to consciously embody the real presence. May we share in a ministry that comes from the strength of the word made flesh and be sources of remedy and healing (beginning with ourselves) to those we encounter.

### **From Bobbi Bugaj**

On Wednesday last I had some errands to care for and a doctor's visit at Hillcrest to get to. There was an elderly woman who I held the door open for going into the doctor's office. We were familiar from other visits; her name is Helen and she is 23 years my senior. She uses a walker and the few times we have met, while she appears to be self-sufficient, I learned that this is not so, her daughter brings her, drops her off and waits outside at Helen's request. For a few seconds on Wednesday I met the daughter and she is a lovely presence. The first things she said to me was thank you, you always hold the door for Mom and talk to her, you are very kind. I smiled and said thank you. It brought me to the concept of kindness. Kindness is a fruit of the Holy Spirit, so we learn and need it to be reflexive. Most of the time, it takes little on my part and I think of it as being civil. I spent much of the rest of the day bringing to mind, kindness. Kindness lifts my spirit and always touches my heart when I am on the receiving end. Someone holding a door, helping me with my gas cap, smiling while walking in a store, saying Good Morning, asking someone how they are doing and really meaning it. They are small gestures but just what it takes in making someone's day. Small acts of kindness have the power to heal a bad day, make someone who feels invisible, visible, and sometimes, making life bearable by bringing joy and happiness in one small second. There is so much grace in kindness and it is the one thing that for the most part requires little effort on my part. Kindness shares itself, when someone is kind to me, I notice that and I immediately pass it on. Kindness is contagious. Kindness bears witness to God in my life, it speaks of how I act and react in a situation, for example, am I so caught up in what I am doing, I just go through the door without looking around. Did I forget to tell the clerk checking me out, thanks and have a good day (and mean it.) Kindness is the image of God shining forth in the world. It gives the receiver something that they need that only another person can give and it is from God. It is the light that shines forth from the giver that says the other person matters in this world and it is being acknowledge. How I get the fruit of this spirit is prayer and Eucharist that sustains me to keep on this path of faith. The Catholic Catechism state that this fruit citing Galatians 5:22-23, describes kindness as a fruit of the Holy Spirit, a manifestation of the presence of God in our lives (CCC 1832). And so, I acknowledge that it is. Kindness is a matter of faith and fruit I receive that I am grateful for and hopefully pass on to others. I do not always see kindness in myself but I am very grateful to God when I receive the kindness of others. I love the Holy Spirit working in my life and kindness is a very sweet fruit.
