<u>The Eucharistic Prayer, 8, Living What We Remember</u> Today's Readings: https://bible.usccb.org/bible/readings/111223.cfm

This act of remembering (Anamnesis) provides us with a sense of hope and consolation, even in times of trouble and turmoil; for the God who has cared for his People in the past (what we are remembering) continues to act in our midst and care for us in the present. It also provides us with a sense of excitement because it propels us into the future to make that future a better place for ourselves and for all with whom we come in contact. "Pie in the sky," you say? Not really, because what we remember and thus share in, by participating in the Eucharist, is the death, resurrection and glorification of Jesus of Nazareth whereby he overcame the power of sin and evil in this world and made it possible for his followers to bring the goodness, love and peace of God himself into their lives and thereby into their world (Romans 6/14: "Sin will no longer have power over you."). This makes it possible for us to be instruments of God's love and peace in this chaotic world, but we must be determined to do this, with God's help, by not allowing sin to have power over us.

If we look at the Mass (the celebration of the Eucharist) in this way, the word "Eucharist" is really not a noun or object. It is a verb, an action – an action of Christ really present in our midst and an action of his community, the Church. "Do this in memory of me" is a mandate from Jesus to celebrate the Eucharist actively. In fact, "to do Eucharist" is a more accurate translation of the Greek original, *eucharistia*, because we participate in Christ's saving action – which, in turn, calls us to the compassion, service and care for all people demonstrated by Jesus. The Sunday Eucharist nourishes and sustains us, gets us out of the pews to serve God and neighbor.

Thus, *anamnesis*, the remembering that we do at Mass, is more than just recalling a past event. Our sharing in the death, resurrection and glorification of Jesus (the Paschal Mystery) and in his conquest of sin makes us part of the great "mystery" of a God who has, throughout history, entered into the lives of his People – not simply to save us individually, but to make us active agents of that saving action, sharing in God's work. FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

On Monday evening I reviewed with the students in the Parish School of Religion the various prayers that are offered in the manner of petition and thanksgiving. I asked them, after



reviewing the prayers, to compose some of their own. I mentioned that I would include some in the bulletin this weekend. One of the students wrote 'I am thankful for the family I was born into". Another prayed for 'good health' and peace in the world. Success in school. Still another composed 'I pray for animal abuse to stop'. Others did focus on education and peace and one the situation in the Middle East. It struck me that these would be

prayers of thanks and petitions that would have the same kind of resonance when I was in junior high. Areas that sound again and continue to reverberate in different generations. That said I recalled on the DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA what are called the SCALA SANCTA. The Holy Stairs (being the translation) I remember visiting Italy with my mother and I ascending those stairs, they are next door to the Lateran Basilica. Many pilgrims were ascending the stairs. What is unique is that they ascend in a prayerful posture. They kneel on each step. It was St. Helen who brought the Stairs to Rome and they were the steps leading up to the praetorium of Pilate. The stairs that Jesus ascended on his way to trial. The posture of kneeling in prayer took me back to a comment made about John F. Kennedy. It was said that before he retired for the evening that he would kneel at the side of the bed and make the sign of the cross. One said it was a quaint custom. Another more insightful person noted that he was acknowledging the kind of dependence upon God in the manner of building up the Kingdom. Whether we kneel or stand there is the appreciation of an attentive practice in praying for the (not forgetting our prayer of thanks) for the ability to build up the Kingdom life here on earth as it is in heaven. (We repeat it often) and with the intention of consciously sharing the life given us to assist with the same building. May we pray for the intentions that need be accorded by every generation for peace and harmony. May we also acknowledge the role that we have in being a people of intentional prayer and thanksgiving.

I have mentioned in the past that this time of year is a time of early preparation praying and thinking about as taught by my own parents. This year, there will be a difference in starting to think about Advent and preparing for the coming of Jesus at Christmas. So while I do not know exactly how this will work, I have decided to call this time going into Advent, Ecce. Ecce is the Latin word for behold. Behold is defined in Oxford Languages dictionary as "see or observe." In these weeks leading up to Advent I am looking inside and around me to what I may have not noticed that I picked up this year and may be have to de-clutter. It was a rough year, Mom was beginning her journey home to the Father and as a community of family, we made it a point that the journey be as easy as we could and now as a community of family, we mourn.
