Wisdom 3: 1-9, 2 **Corinthians 5:1, 6-10,** John 11:17-27

In the fourth chapter of his Rule, St. Benedict wrote: "Day by day remind yourself that you are going to die" (RB4.47). While he is not advocating an obsession with death, he is indicating the best way to embrace life. We can only turn our gaze to the one thing that matters by owning our mortality. The COVID pandemic has brought the reality of human frailty and mortality to our attention. While confronting our human frailty, it is important to keep in mind that we are mortal creatures who have been created for immortality. This awareness is addressed by the Psalmist. "Teach us to number our days, that we may gain wisdom of heart" (Ps. 90:12). I wonder how different would our lives be if we kept death daily before our eyes? By keeping the reality of death before our eyes, we free ourselves to live richer lives.

Today's somber celebration helps counterbalance our tendency to simply read Scripture texts that make us feel good. By remembering the souls of those who have gone before us and visiting their graves. we are forced to admit that we are dust, and like those whose graves we visit, we shall return to dust. The author of the Letter to the Hebrews wrote: "We have no lasting city here, but we are seeking one that is to come" (Heb. 13: 14).

The more we remember the past, the more accurately will we be able to set our gaze on the future. "For our citizenship is in heaven from where we eagerly await the return of our savior, the Lord Jesus Christ" (Phil. 3:20). While we grieve the loss of loved ones, faith tells us that Christ has conquered death. Granted, each of us will die someday, but none of us is not subject to death's power because in Christ God has conquered death.

FROM The PASTOR'S Desk

In the traffic of life, it would seem that the word "indicator" might come into play. At times I have experienced certain vehicles changing lanes without an opportunity to allow the rest of traffic to acknowledge a change in direction by indicating left or right. It might occasion a prayer for those who are perhaps lost and needing to arrive at a destination in haste. Perhaps, and there are bumps in the road as well and for those of us without a GPS a need to stop and ask for directions. I was remembering a response when an individual asked a traffic policeman about directions admitting he was lost. The response came 'Buddy, you can't get there from here'. The word "traffic" (from the Italian 'traffico') became used in the early 1800's having to with transport and people



and vehicles. People coming and going. As we come to the close of this liturgical season with the celebration of the Feast of Christ the King it may be a time to acknowledge our future travel plans. How far have we/I come in relationship to our journey in faith? Have we/I moved close along the highway of life in the direction of the imitation of Je-

sus? Ideally our itinerary is HIS WAY AND TRUTH AND LIFE. That might ask for how well we are progressing towards the life of heaven. (Indicated by the way one asks for a directional proclaiming of His way.) It also may ask for some frankness about how we are progressing and honest introspection as to our life's direction in His Way. "Hasten slowly" were words spoken to me often by one Fr. Haas. Some of you may be aware of his presence at St. Thomas Hospital in Akron. It was Fr. Hass who was of assistance to the founders of Alcoholics Anonymous. I keep photos of him in the residence in a couple of places with the 'hastening' recollection. I also think of progress and not perfection in living the Gospel as well as what the recovery programs counsel. It was Our Blessed Mother who hastened to the house of Elizabeth. Travel was perhaps slow as it was a distance, I was told by one priest who made the journey. That said as we anticipate Advent and His first coming we still may be given an opportunity to reflect on His second coming. Are we moving in the direction of Jesus? Have we made changes in our Gospel itinerary (go and announce the Gospel of the Lord) Can we get there from where we are presently with the THERE being the life that awaits us as our final destination? As Our Lady hastened and arrived at the house of Elizabeth she was acknowledged as Blessed. May we as well seek to be blessed presences in our trafficking through our day to day until He returns. May we hasten slowly.

This past Tuesday's evening prayer was 1 John 3:1-3 and begins "See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called Children of God." I started to think about that the Monday before off and on while getting ready to teach 7th grade Parish School of Religion. Before heading to Mass at 6:30, with the class, I gave them an assignment. Watch the rhythm and prayers said during Mass. My goal was to point out the significance of Christ the King, the liturgical year and what would start and end. After Mass and back in the classroom, they were broken up into two groups, I handed 1 group the song book and another group the Roman Missal. Their assignment, take the readings and plan the Mass. The completed plan was a glimpse of their faith that I wish I would have had when I was their age. The songs in order Gather Your People, Christ Be Our Light, Bread of Life, and We Remember. The Penitential Rite being the Confiteor and they wanted to make sure that the prayer "May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to ever-lasting life." The final prayer was "May your people receive your holy blessing. O Lord, we pray and by that gift, spurn all that would harm them and obtain what they desire. Through Christ our Lord." As I was putting together the Mass plan, it said a lot about faith, hope, charity and the life they were choosing to follow. The recessional song, We remember" is what they wanted people to leave to, to take out in the world as their prayer. For Christ the King, it is the King that walks with them and lets the Holy Spirit guide them. The plan spoke of being one with Christ, being chosen at baptism (make us your own) and being light for the world. The songs speak of service and comfort. Healing and forgiveness, loving to death and rising to be with them now. Their plan was simple, what their King looked like and how he would want them to live. Their plan was the cross, redemption and salvation. God never stop loving them, never stopped feeding them and the love that takes them out into the world is service to others. I loved it and they loved it when instructions were given. I would check in on them, offering secrets of the book but not opinions on the work. It was perfect, it was them, it was comfort, mercy, forgiveness and love going out in to the world with Jesus as their King. Not necessarily a recognizable King, but a King non the less. Their King of heaven and earth. Looking at the prayers, the songs, the Mass parts chosen, I could almost be jealous if they had not given me a glimpse of heaven and their faith in this assignment. Their offer of hope and what sustains them. We did not have enough time for intercessions but I heard them during Mass when Father asked. They prayed for friends and family. They are living in a difficult time and they are at a difficult age, but what shines through is the light that is their faith. This Monday night, I got to see the heart of saints welcoming me to their image of Christ the King and in every song and prayer I love their faith. They are children of God.


CHRISTMAS CONCERT - Save the Date!
