Guest Article :

On this Good Shepherd Sunday, it makes me think back on my own experiences of being a shepherd, and what sheep are like. I don't know if I was a good shepherd, but I sure had a lot of love for my sheep. I probably wouldn't have been willing to lay down my life for them, but I was happy to make a lot of sacrifices. It all started in the spring of 1974. I would have been in the sixth grade, and most of my siblings were gone by this time – either married or away at school. My dad had helped me get into the chicken business when I was in second grade. He would drive me to the local town to sell eggs to people we knew at 50 cents a dozen. It taught me the value of money. So, this spring of 1974 I came to my dad with a proposal. Up till then, we had horses on our ten acres of pasture. They used our barns and corrals. But those horses weren't producing any money; they were only costing money. I talked my dad into selling the horses and letting me buy some sheep. We checked the local paper and saw an ad where they were selling pregnant ewes for \$45 apiece. We came home with three that I bought with my own money. Over time I added to my little flock, and I usually had around 26 or so, if you count the lambs too. As I've mentioned in another homily, I would butcher the lambs myself when they were big enough, and sell the meat to people we knew. My dad would get some meat too, for our household, in payment for the land and buildings. I would also give a lamb or two each year to my sister's convent. I had learned early on that God blesses those who are generous. I would sell the wool, too, but it didn't bring in much at that time. A lot of the time the sheep would take care of themselves in our pasture. But other times I would have to herd them on other parts of my dad's farm. I would do it before school in the morning, and then again afterwards when I got home. It was very important to keep a close eye on them when they were having their babies in the spring. Sometimes I would have to pull a little bit when she was pushing. You quite often had to help the newborn lambs find the nipple. They could stand very soon after sliding out, but their energy would start to wane if they didn't get milk in their bellies. Sometimes they would be poking around with their nose and mouth in the wrong place, looking for the mother's nipples. And she, in her nervousness, would be moving around and trying to lick them off. Once you got them to suck, though, they were usually off to the races. It was so fun to see the lambs cavort and run around and buck and hop and play in the green pasture. They were so carefree.

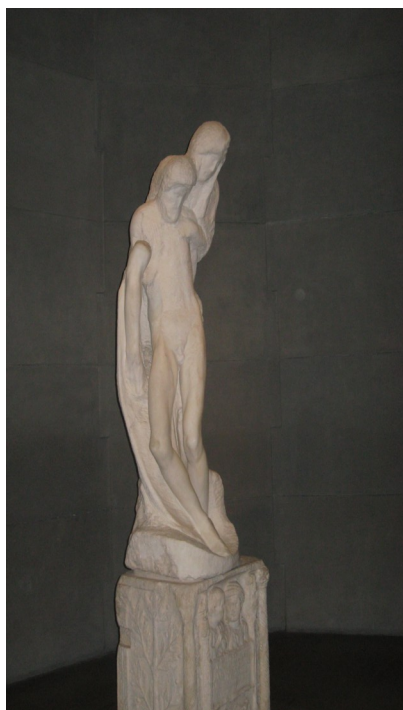

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

The word "circumspect" came to mind this past week as a descriptor shared by a family member. I recall Mark Twain being quoted in the words 'don't use a five-dollar word when a fifty-cent word will do' (of course the economy being what it is, the word may be inflated as well). The word itself comes from Latin and literally means 'looking about on all sides'. The direction of considering with attentiveness. The word "presumption" may come into play. How many of us take for granted that we are prepared for the return of Jesus? We read in Matthew 25: 1 to 13, the parable of the ten virgins. A moral instruction to make wise preparation for the coming of Jesus in His kingdom. Five had foresight (prudently thinking and prepared) when the bridegroom



arrived and so the procession began leaving the other five seeking after oil for their lamps. In a word they were not adequately prepared. The command **STAY AWAKE** sums up the parable. Recall as well the words 'you know not the day nor the hour'. We appreciate what we may have learned as well the cardinal virtues. The four are pivotal and essential as well. They involve both the mind and our character. Inasmuch

as our bodies (and souls) were imprinted with and we were signed in the oil of anointing at Baptism and sealed at Confirmation. Prudence assists in carrying out the proper course of acting in a given situation and the appropriate time. It is the consideration of consequences or conclusions. I find it interesting that the Latin "consequi" means to follow after. To that degree liturgically we are often given the direction of announcing the Gospel of the Lord which we appreciate as the closing rite. May we be conscious of being attentive to a direction of life that not only looks at all sides of in our decision making but also a prudent understanding of how best to implement the influence of the One we are baptized into and await His return.

FROM BOBBI BUGAJ

During the Easter Season there is always for me a image to reflect on. What has changed in my heart? This Lent I went on the path of metanoia a journey of a change of heart. I asked to look at my whole heart and that would include a prideful heart, a stony heart, an envious heart, but mostly it came down to a lukewarm and wishy-washy heart. This journey turned out to be a kind of journey where I looked and grimaced and said "yeah, that is me." So once the Easter and the Easter Season started I looked at how God's quiet presence said, "Through Jesus Christ our Lord." We hear those words at Mass during all the prayers to God and I ask myself (thinking of a wishy-washy heart) when and where am I wishy-washy and I could not think of any times. (This does not mean I am not wishy-washy, I just could not think of any.) I smiled this morning when it came up in my prayer time and said, "Ok, I am going to revisit this later because right now, in this spot, on my deck, in a coat, all I feel is the presence of God and that is where I need to be." Changes of heart are slow, they are not easy, but in that moment, where my heart went one place and my mind wanted to go another, the heart won. I thought of all the fruits of my life that I have received in this silence. Today it was love and peace. It is in that silence that I thought of all the times that the Spirit changed the path of my life and it was always, the right path. That, as I have grown older, I have come to sit on a fence and found in the silence, the right side to get off. I am now learning that while it is in my nature to control, that wishy washy moment was my surrender to walk in faith and leave the world behind. I also learned overtime that it was a choice of faith and the knowledge that I walk in Jesus's footsteps. That in the silence, I make this choice everyday and do not notice it. What I do notice is that it is in my breathing and the quietness of my heart, sitting on the fence of the morning, listening to the birds sing, that I am aware of God presence the most. (This repeats at night too when it is warm enough to go out on the deck.) The thought that I choose this every day, in every breath I take, every action I do, every encounter I have, makes me smile. It brings joy and happiness that I can acknowledge while not perfect, I am walking (mostly) in the footsteps of Jesus. There is a change of heart every day and I find mercy, forgiveness, compassion and God's love. Every prayer I say, every desire in my heart to change, starts and ends with the words "Through Jesus Christ your Son." There is peace and healing in the thought that every day I choose to walk this path and renew my heart. I choose God multiple times a day, in multiple ways a day, and that thought alone, heals my heart. I love how it is in the silence that God's presence says get off on this side of the fence.
