*Light on the Liturgy*

Liturgical Renewal, 19: Liturgy and Architecture

Before the reforms enacted by Vatican II, the liturgy as celebrated for over a thousand years in the Roman Rite, to which we belong, was centered very much on the clergy – in practice on the priest. The laity “attended” the priest's liturgy. This understanding naturally affected the way churches were built. The transition from seeing the church building as the place where God's People gathered to thank and praise God and to be nourished for the journey to the Kingdom to a building where the laity “attended Mass” which was “said” by the priest – this transition took place gradually over several centuries and was controlled by the changing understanding of “Church” from being the People of God to being the domain of the clergy to which the laity belonged.

This transition began already in the 4<sup>th</sup> century with the emperor Constantine who, in effect, made Christianity the favored religion in the Empire – ending the persecutions but leading to other consequences that affected the Church deeply but not always positively. The bishops became civil dignitaries, like the Roman Magistrates, with authority over the “common folk” rather than being seen as fellow members of the People of God. Secondly, it became fashionable to be a Christian, and many people entered the Church without proper preparation and a personal conversion of heart. Thus, these new Christians did not appreciate the reasons for, or the value of, the liturgy and simply stopped going. This led to liturgical practices and rules revolving around the clergy and the monastic communities.

Finally, all of this affected the way churches were built. It led to the long, narrow churches where the clergy and the liturgy were separated from the laity by a long distance and by a barrier, the Communion railing – hardly an atmosphere for communal prayer. The few laity who did attend were simply passive spectators observing a clerical liturgy. Many reforms of Church life culminating in those of St. Pius X (1903-1914) led to a return of the laity to the churches, but still as passive spectators. These reforms did not affect the design of the churches until Vatican II because the understanding of “Church” was still modeled on medieval monarchy rather than on the biblical images of the People of God and the Body of Christ. ## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Rebooting is a form of restarting. That would be an exercise in patience (for me) in a world that sometimes expects instant results. The early days of Covid asked for much patience and accommodation as we entered into an uncertain time. Patience and accommodation being the operative words. In visiting family in Italy, the expression “accomodare se stessi” would also mean make yourself at home or “si prega di fare a casa.” Some would say it is about making room and provisions. That said, we have



many provisions in our efforts to cooperate with the medical community during the height of the pandemic. Perhaps the time has come for rebooting. One of the ministries to reboot would be our Parish Council and membership. At the time of pandemic we depended upon members who were available to coordinate various parish activities. We are grateful for their time and input and service. We have posted the members of the community who are willing to serve on the council. I appreciate the willingness of so many to offer their time and talent to, again, restart the care and development of parish ministries. Some have continued in the planning of our monthly healing masses. Our St. Martin Cloak fund has devised a means to offer assistance to the ones in need. We did close (during the height of the pandemic) our pantry. All donations prior were given over to a local pantry. Other donations that come in also are offered there as well. The Martineers have begun meeting and planning again for activities for seniors. We restarted the Souper Bowl. The summer picnic as well as our Annual Trash and Treasure were well received. Finance Council met via zoom as well as St. Benedict Board meetings. Our day school (Pre K and Kinder and day care on this campus) have returned as well as Monday evening Parish School of Religion. During the pause we also were unable to offer The Cup at communion time. We were advised by the Bishop's office that we may resume the offering of the Precious Blood. This restarting of our liturgical practice will be discussed with the Pastoral Council. There will be an opportunity for catechesis prior to our Advent participation. We still may experience some change and limitations in the near future. That said, we will hopefully continue to make the kind of accommodations that will help to reboot parish ministries and make real ACCOMODARE SE STESSI as this is our home.

### ***From Bobbi Bugaj***

This last Tuesday evening prayer included Psalm 49. It begins “Hear this, all you peoples” and the 1st line of the second verse is “My lips will speak words of wisdom.” My mind immediately went to James 3:17 “But the wisdom from above is first of all pure, then peaceable, gentle, compliant, full of mercy and good fruits, without inconstancy or insincerity.” Wisdom is one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit that I pray for as it is given in Confirmation. I feel like I need the wisdom of God a lot in a world that is sometimes hostile. I also noticed that I agree with all that James 3:17 says about the gift. On deeper reflection I can acknowledge that I have received this gift along the way, when I cannot figure out why life has to be what it is and then the thought comes,(a question really) why are you so anxious about a life that fades away when I have given you eternal life. Or when God asks, why do you care what other people think when you are following my journey, just walk with me. Those are the times that wisdom has increased my faith, reminded me that this world is finite and his Kingdom is everlasting. Both of those meditations that arose bring me peace and are a gentle reminder that my desire to control the world is above my pay scale. The peace that I find in the wisdom of God is an inward grace that finds an outward expression in my life. I can share what I have discovered in my prayer with the world that makes it maybe just a little more brighter with my sharing. I find that I am receptive to this wisdom most in prayer, when I am pointing out to God all the bad things in my life and I am reminded to stop and open my heart. When I stop and listen, there is peace and God is always gentle with me, changing a whining, self centered child into a child of God. The wisdom of God is for everyone who so chooses to believe and accept it. It brings my faith to perfection in my constant praying. It makes me grow in my faith, and makes the decisions of the world all that much easier. God’s wisdom is always constant and always sincere, God does not change, I do. Like all the gifts of the Holy Spirit that I have over time received, I do not always recognize that the Spirit has spoken through me until someone says “Wow” and I think, where did that come from. Wisdom perfects my faith that is so much a part of me, that I do not think about it. Wisdom shows me what faith, hope and love is and how it works in my life. Wisdom brings me joy.
