## *Light on the Liturgy by Ed Francis*

Trinity Sunday: God as the Model of Our Lives

What we celebrate today, Trinity Sunday, is a foundational teaching that, provides the context and basis for everything else we believe and for the way we live as followers of Christ. Given the so-called, largely invented, "cultural wars" that so dominate our political discourse today, it is easy to be misled into thinking that the essence of Christianity or, for us, Catholicism revolves around sexual teachings. Actually, sexual ethics is one small part of Moral Theology, which is itself a small part of a very lengthy *Catechism*. What Christianity is all about is a merciful, loving God who has saved us in Christ Jesus and sent the Holy Spirit to dwell among us, to lead us, a pilgrim people, to God's Kingdom, and to help us live according to the teaching and example of Jesus so as to help build that Kingdom of love and goodness. We cannot be distracted from that basic mission by debates whose purpose is, all too often, largely political.

What does the teaching on the Trinity have to do with all of this? Again, we cannot be distracted by the fact that this is a mystery that we do not fully understand. It is better to focus on what we do know. Our God is three distinct persons, individuals, involved in such a perfect relationship that they are completely united, sharing in one nature. We humans know relationships - unfortunately, all too often, of an imperfect kind. It is the life of the Trinity that provides a model for a good relationship, a model for how we are to live with one another. The Trinity is the perfect community, lived out for all eternity. Jesus, as the Son of God, knows that Trinitarian life intimately and teaches us, in practical terms, how to live it: "As I have loved you, so you should also love one another" (Jn. 13/34). And in another place: "Whatever you do for the least of my brothers and sisters, you do for me" (Mt. 25/31-46). St. Paul is even more practical: "Love is patient...kind...does not seek its own interests...and never fails..." (I Cor. 13/1-13). This is what our religion is all about.

## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

We mourn the death of Fr. John Vrana. I received a call this past Tuesday that he had died. Fr. John (as many of you remember) was the third pastor here at St. Martin of Tours. In the fall of 1975 Fr. John published an article based on his dissertation anticipating a degree as a Doctor of Sacred Theology. That would have been in 1974. I remember serving mass with Fr. John there at St. Mary seminary (then on Ansel road) before he left for Louvain. When he returned to the seminary he was appointed professor of Moral Theology. He was also appointed a delegate or liaison for the Charismatic Catholic Renewal in our diocese. I would accompany him as a deacon at Sunday



liturgies and eventually he agreed to be my advisor for the writing of my master of divinity paper about the history of the Charismatic movement. In the article he gave me he wrote of the concept of the common good in the social teaching of the Catholic church. It was about the care and maintenance of the common good in our society. One of the conclusions he arrived at was that the CONCEPT OF THE COMMON GOOD IMPLIES, AND THUS DRAWS OUR ATTENTION TO, THE DIGNITY AND IMPORTANCE OF THE HUMAN PERSON. So true today. He went on to conclude that the common good has a religious significance. IT SPEAKS OF THE DIVINE VOCATION GIVEN TO MAN AND OF THE CHRISTIAN VOCATION TO LIVE IN BROTHERHOOD AND TO FOSTER THE REALITY OF THE KINGDOM IN THIS WORLD. The concept of the common good, he writes, is not only a human ideal but a LIVED REALITY. Many of us have experienced his goodness in his priesthood and service to our diocese and community. When I was assigned to Sts. Philip and James in the 1980's he would share in the weekend liturgies and also prepare and serve ( as he did here I believe) what amounted to gourmet meals. Interesting how his interest in 'cooking' (both preparing and serving) has me thinking about the word liaison which originally a term for a thickening agent for sauces. It comes from the latin (as well) ligare which means to bind. May our memory of Fr. John bind us as well to seek the common good and live in communion and foster the Kingdom of God in service to Christ and to one another.

### **St. Jude Walk**



On Wednesday I gardened and planted tomato plants with my Mom. We gathered the necessary pots, soil, tomato plants and some plant nutrients. This year, since not all the plants will fit in our small spot, we are going to try and raise them in pots. The selection was important we had to pick the right pot. Tomatoes need space for a good root system, so I needed a big pot. Getting good soil was also important, so it arriving in bags and bags of potting soil. Then the approach and distancing and placement need to plant them properly covering about two thirds of the stem. I need to add support now, because I could hurt the roots trying to tie them up later. Soil has to be placed to one inch below the top of the pot leaving room for mulch that will keep some moisture in the soil and so the vigilant task will have to water regularly, keeping the soil moist but not saturated and I will need to nurture them. It will take dedicated time on my part to keep these plants thriving so that they can mature and bear tomatoes. Going forward, I am responsible for some of the watering, (rain will water too), picking a good spot so they get as much sun as possible, feeding them in the future, in short, giving what I can so they bear fruit. The growing part of this, is all on God. It gave me pause to think this is also a meditation in living my life in Christ. He created me, gave me my roots, and now as an adult I am responsible for continual growth and cultivation and to do those things I can to keep alive and well my spiritual being. I have to move to an area to extend His presence in this world, and plant myself deep enough to develop deeper roots. Through Eucharist, reconciliation, scripture and my daily prayers those roots will grow. I have committed to do what is needed to keep the soil moist and nurtured. I need to be conscious of any weeds that choke the growth by recognizing that they do not belong there. I also recognize that I will not do this alone. God has placed people in my life to help along the way. They are the ones that show me the face of God in the world. They are everyone, family, strangers, people I have and have not met. They have moved me both physically and spiritually to the place where the sun shines. People who have weathered storms with me and people who just stopped to help in passing. I cannot grow without the love of God that I take for granted, and sometimes not even recognizing that He is there and I can do nothing without Him. I cannot make the plant grow, I can lovingly attend it with feeding and watering, but the photosynthesis that has to take place, that is the miracle of God in my life. It is nice to meditate on all the things that God does for me, and also what I need to be doing in my life to help grow, but the miracle of growing, that is the loving presence of God in my life. If I am not careful with all the participating required of me, these plants will not grow, these plants will not bear fruit, but when I participate with God, the miracle of life and life everlasting is here, now and in the future. It is nice to be reminded, that I must participate in this life with Christ and that Christ is there making miracles happen.
