

How literally should we read Scripture? The two readings we have just listened to pose problems for those who advocate for reading the Bible too literally. In our first reading we heard about Abraham and Hagar and Ishmael. It said, "Early the next morning Abraham got some bread and a skin of water and gave them to Hagar. Then, placing the child on her back, he sent them away." That all makes perfect sense if the child is one or two, but what if he is 15? Would you place him on his mother's back and have her cart him through the desert on an arduous journey? No wonder the water ran out so guickly! The passage continues, "As she roamed aimlessly in the wilderness of Beer sheba, the water in the skin was used up. So she put the child down under a shrub." Not only was she lugging a 15-year-old boy, but water, provisions, and all their belongings too, which, granted, probably wasn't all that much.

So, how old was Ishmael at the time? Let's do a little math. Our reading this morning was from chapter 21 of Genesis. Earlier, in chapter 16, it says, "Abraham was eighty-six years old when Hagar bore him Ishmael." The opening verse of our reading this morning was, "Abraham was a hundred years old when his son Isaac was born to him." Okay, 100 minus 86 equals 14. Then, we are told in today's reading, it is at the time of his weaning that Abraham held a great feast and that's when Sarah noticed Ishmael playing with Isaac and demanded of Abraham, "Drive out that slave and her son! No son of that slave is going to share the inheritance with my son Isaac!" Let's say Isaac was one year old when he was weaned. 14 plus 1 equals 15. Certainly, it would make more sense for a 15-year-old boy to walk rather than be carried by his mother. We mustn't think of all the sacred writers of the Bible taking dictation from an angel. The human element has to be taken into consideration. What is recorded in Genesis was oral tradition for hundreds of years before it was written down by the final redactor. This sacred writer had such reverence and respect for the various strands of tradition that he chose to weave them together rather than reconcile them. Scholars detect four main strands, represented by the letters J, E, P, D. These represent four traditions: Yahwist, Elohist, Priestly, and Deuteronomist. Picture it like a braided rope. As you're looking at the rope from one side you see one strand come around and disappear, then another, then another, then the first one again. The tradition that would make Ishmael one or two at the time is different than the one that would make him 15. Continued next week .....

# FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

This past week in 2 Corinthians, there was a (somewhat) indirect reference to the moment of death of Jesus in Mark's Gospel. The temple veil was torn in two at His death. The temple itself was the place for sacrifices. There, a veil separated the Holy of Holies (the presence of God and in the Letter to the Hebrews, the inner room and the dwelling place of God). Again, we read in Hebrews 'since the blood of Christ assures our entrance into the sanctuary by the new and living path he has opened for us through the veil (the VEIL meaning his flesh). It came to my mind as we will, in two weeks,



celebrate the Feast of Corpus Christi as to how well I/we unveil the presence of Christ that is within us sacramentally as well as the Eucharistic sacrifice that we partake in at our liturgy each time we celebrate. Interesting too is how the word 'reveal' comes from velum (a veil) and how best we reveal or disclose or better seek to unveil that presence in our day to day. As noted, this past Thursday we read from 2 Corinthians and I found it challenging as St. Paul shared that when we

turn to the Lord the veil (he referenced Moses having to don a veil when he returned from the mountain) is removed and later shared AND WE ALL. WITH UNVEILED FACE. BEHOLDING THE GLORY OF GOD ARE BEING CHANGED INTO HIS LIKENESS FROM ONE DEGREE OF GLORY TO ANOTH-ER. Do we/l give due consideration or daily examine on how we are being transformed into likeness? We read further in the same letter about the 'light shining in darkness' and there was an association with the book of Genesis and the creation account and LET THERE BE LIGHT. Again, an association with the reading from Matthew (Sermon on the Mount) this past week and the words YOU ARE THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD. during the Parish Religion Sessions, we would have liturgy with different grade levels. Over the years I would ask the children what the best part of their day was and eventually the response (over time) was BEING HERE (at the liturgy). We would end the liturgy with the song THIS LITTLE LIGHT OF MINE and one of the students offered another verse DON'T HIDE IT UNDER A BUSHEL BASKET. LET T SHINE LET IT SHINE LET IT SHINE. Hopefully the best part of our weekly practice is being in communion with Jesus in the Eucharist. May we realize gradually the unveiling of the presence of Jesus to all those we encounter in our day to day experience.

### From Bobbi Bugaj

At our Pentecost celebration Sunday, I began once again to reflect and consider how the Holy Spirit works in my life. How the Spirit's presence empowers me to live my life. Then I thought, would the word empower the right word because you hear it a lot. According to the On-Line Dictionary (my cell phone did not like Webster's that day) the definition was "give authority, power or the ability to do something." I thought hmmmm. It was a good word but I would have to ponder it. At Baptism there was a part of the prayer that when I hear it I just love. "God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ has freed you from sin, given you new birth by water and the Holy Spirit and joined you into his people. He now anoints you with the Chrism of salvation so that you may remain a member of Christ, Priest, Prophet and King until eternal life." This prayer occurs after the Baptism and during the anointing. This prayer seems so much more than just the definition for empower. Then I got it, the Spirit does not give me this once, I get it every minute of every day. The Spirit is constantly guiding me. Signaling and pushing slightly down a path that asks for some participation on my part. Gifts received by me and passed on, but not static. I am to constantly hear the word of God, speak the word of God, but in a loving and compassionate way. I get a smile on my face when I think of my Baptism because after 67 years I can honestly say that I have pictured God the Father, loving me, forgiving me and pulling his hair out some times. Baptism has freed me and also given me a mission. I mostly think of it as a mission of love. To teach the word of God in words and actions, but that starts in my heart and mind. My heart rules but sometimes my mind and pushes buttons that I wish were not pushed. (I refused to talk about control here, we all know that is a big button.) My Baptism brought me into the faith, made me a child of God, helped through bad times, brought a meaning to my journey through faith, hope and love. There is a movement in this world, in my heart, to daily see the image of God in the world. There is a movement of longing to walk this path in love because I get to see eternal life with God. There is the movement of others helping me on this path, the movement of forgiveness. The Spirit allows me to grow. I figured out what I did not like about the word empower, whether it is true or not, I did not like that it looked static and my life with the spirit is not static. I learn and live a faith that grows. In 67 years I have learned what love can look like, when I let the spirit lead and I have learned healing, compassion, to laugh at myself, and that forgiveness is two ways, from me and to me. I am not sure about this definition of empower, but I love where the Spirit leads and today the Spirit says, all is done in love.
