## *Light on the Liturgy* by Ed Francis

### Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi)

Today's feast, the *Body and Blood of Christ*, honors the sacrament of the Eucharist, both the "Real Presence" and the full action of the sacrament (the Mass), which makes sacramentally present the redemptive death and resurrection of Christ. The feast, originally called "The Body and Blood of Christ;" became known during the Middle Ages as "The Body of Christ" (*Corpus Christi* in Latin) because the piety at the time too often focused on seeing the Consecrated Host rather than participating and receiving Communion.

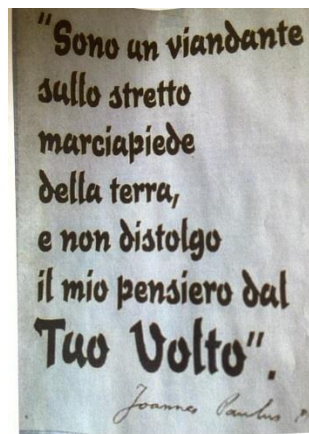
The problem with this was the unfortunate belief held by some that salvation comes through seeing the Host – rather than through the person of Christ, divine and human, and through his death and resurrection. Also, many lay people at the time did not attend Mass regularly (*attend* is what they did rather than *participate*). Even those who did go to church seldom received Communion, except during Easter time, as the law required. It is interesting that the ringing of bells during the Consecration is also related to these practices. The bells were used to call people, who were praying privately or simply distracted, back to what was happening at the altar. In some places the outside church bells were rung at the consecration to tell those outside the church, who did not attend Mass, that the Consecration was taking place.

The question now is: what does this background on the feast tell us about the Eucharist today? First, we must not fall back into the idea that "Eucharist" only means the Real Presence – as important as that is. The "Eucharistic Renewal," called for by our bishops, means a more meaningful participation in the full sacrament of the Eucharist, the Mass, and not just a return to Benediction and Eucharistic adoration. This leads to a second point: Our participation in the Eucharist is to be the source and summit of our lives (Vat. II, *Liturgy Constitution*, #10 & 2). We bring to the Eucharist all that we are - our joys, sorrows and shortcomings, offer them to the Father and are healed, nourished and strengthened to go forth from there to improve ourselves and, as the Church community, to build the Kingdom of God.

## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Recollecting St. Anthony of Padua this past week, what came to my mind were the usual connections with the revered Franciscan saint. Many of us recall his assistance at finding lost articles. Others remember the appearance of the child Jesus in his arms. I recall as well the blessing of St. Anthony bread on the memorial connected with St. Anthony (sometimes) guild masses. Recollections of customs as well as blessings with the intent of being mindful of the poor are important. I also remember having visited the basilica a number of times. I have a cousin who lives in Padua. I

also have a cousin whose in-law makes a pilgrimage to Padua to attend mass (some 18 kilometers) in keeping with a promise he made for a special intention. The times I have visited I am always somewhat overwhelmed by the number of people who attach photos and hand written notes very close to the relics of the saint. I noticed too that as I walked beyond the reliquary, which hold both his tongue and jawbone, there were at least four confessional boxes and in different languages. Known for his oratory, it was said of the saint that when he spoke of certain addictions (gambling for one) his words alone brought conversion and change. Saint Anthony's public speaking had a direct effect. I wonder how many folks are conscious (not only of the lost articles and bread blessing) of some his writings. I thought of that in recalling the presence of the areas for reconciliation. In speaking about Pentecost he wrote OUR HUMBLE AND SINCERE REQUEST TO THE SPIRIT FOR OURSELVES SHOULD BE THAT WE MAY BRING THE DAY OF PENTECOST TO FULFILLMENT, INSOFAR AS THE SPIRIT INFUSES US WITH HIS GRACE, BY USING OUR BODILY SENSES IN A PERFECT MANNER AND BY KEEPING HIS COMMANDMENTS. Fodder, I suspect, for an examination of conscience as we can be infused by other influences contrary to the life of the gospel. The most recent visit to Padua with my mother had me looking at a glassed enclosed saying SONO UN VIANDANTE SULLO STRETTO MARCIAPIEDE DELLA TERRA, E NON DISTOLGO IL MIO PENSIERO DAL TUO VOLTO. The source of quote with signature at bottom was Joannes Paulus II. Translation (as best I am able) I AM A WAYFARER ON THE NARROW SIDEWALK OF THE EARTH, I DO NOT DISTRACT MY THOUGHT FROM YOUR FACE. As we proceed through life may our thoughts be directed to the manner of living that longs to see His face.

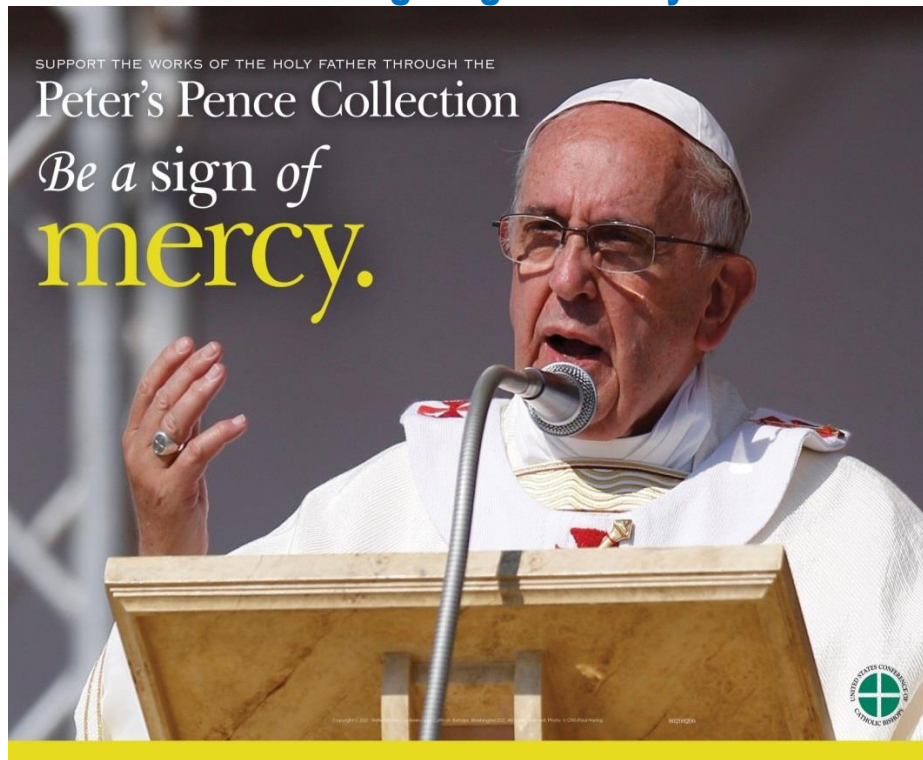
### **St. Jude Walk**

This past Tuesday's evening prayer began with the words "your love must be sincere". It was the first time that this particular reading cycled around since the Feast of Pentecost. My thought was that Jesus showed us a love like no other when He died on the cross, rose from the dead and Ascended into heaven. My faith gives me the strength to (reciprocate) return that love and sometimes it is not easy as I work at following in the footsteps of Jesus to love, foster encouragement, teach and model that love as best I can in myself. I hope that in doing so that I draw others to that life, that I am trying to make interior. One of the hardest things that I find is letting others assist or care for me. I have no problem assist and caring for others but accepting that assistance service in return is often difficult. Maybe because I have yet to learn to accept it gratefully perhaps pride or stubbornness gets in the way. On Tuesday, I used the Holy Thursday foot washing, an action of love in table service, as an example. I am willing to wash someone's feet but not have my own feet washed. I have excuses, my feet are ugly with arthritis or they are hot and sweaty and in doing so, I miss part of the point, to let others be Christ for me. It is almost, like I said earlier, I am not comfortable letting others be Christ for me and I don't seek to recognize the face of Christ in others. I miss some parts of the love of Christ that is present in others. The mask of pride and self-sufficiency is not a great mask for me to wear as it does not teach others God's love. God's love transforms the world and myself and I can be absent from His care through others. It is the humility that I perhaps can lack when I put on the mask of pride. God's love is not easy when following in the footsteps of Christ and acknowledging pride and working on lifting the mask puts me on the right path in this journey. It is interesting to ask, why is it so much easier to give then to receive when I cannot grow in love without the receiving and how much do I refuse to receive. God's love is sincere, and thankfully he is very forgiving and shows mercy. It is also wise and discerning. Thinking about sincere love and working on it in my life starting with prayer and Eucharist, confession and the thought, I do not walk this journey alone, he places others here to guide me. God chooses others to be his face to me and in doing so, increases my faith. When others serve me, I learn that God's love is not uncomfortable unless I make it so. Unless I put the mask of pride on, but it is so much more when I take it off.
