(Ephesians 1: 11-14, Luke 12:1-7)

"When I am gone, always be reminded that whenever you stand for your truth, you will be keeping my voice and the voices of our nations and our people alive" (Sacheen, Littlefeather; Breaking the Silence). In 1973, Littlefeather was the first Native American to appear at the Academy Awards when Marlon Brando asked her to refuse the Oscar on his behalf. The drama of that evening highlighted the necessity of living by and for moral values. As members of the Body of Christ, we are sacramental people. Our words and actions should signify divine truth. Through baptism, we have been made children of God and heirs of the Kingdom. Through our forebears in the faith, God has passed on to us the mystery of his sovereign will and the grace of redemption. Through the mystery of the Incarnation, the Word of God took flesh and became tangible. By the movement of the Holy Spirit, God has called us to make the Saving Word living and active in our day. Our response to this call will be countercultural because, as the Lord said, "My thoughts are nothing like your thoughts, and your ways are not like my ways: (Is. 55:8). By the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, God has united all the members of the human race in His Beloved Son. Gazing upon us with the eyes of mercy, God has recreated us. The creator and sustainer of the universe has entrusted to us the care of all that he has made. It is here that we stand in opposition to a consumer-minded society. Recall this cautionary note from Saint Paul. "What do you have that you did not receive? And if you did receive it, why do you boast as though it were not a gift?" (1 Cor. 4:7). Saint Matthew records Jesus's command. "What you have received as a gift, give as a gift" (Mat. 10: 8). This command is expanded in another passage. "You wicked servant. I forgave your whole debt because you pleaded with me. Shouldn't you have been generous towards your fellow servant, as I dealt generously with you?" (Mat. 18:32-33) He who dispenses his blessings according to his good pleasure expects us to be generous to those in need. This is why we were made, to be our brothers' and sisters' keepers and helpers. We who have received mercy upon mercy because of God's infinite patience with us are called to be fountains of love and compassion for all the members of the human race, especially the poor and marginalized. The Lord gave us an example when he emptied himself to fill us up. Every time we pour ourselves out in the service of others we manifest God's superabundant loving-kindness to us.

These days there are many sad and distressing things happening. But even amid hardship and pain, we can be agents of love and compassion. We must not be afraid to testify to the immensity of God's love for all people. It's as easy as reaching out a hand to do good, showing the love of Christ, drying a tear bringing comfort to the lonely, showing the way to one who is lost, consoling the broken-hearted, helping the fallen, teaching those looking for the truth, or offering an erring soul a fresh start. By learning to place the blessings God has given us at the service of others we can provide for the needs of the poor and help heal our wounded humanity. Littlefeather, who died October 2, 2022, concluded her remarks on that night in 1973 with these beautiful words. "I beg at this time that I have not intruded upon this evening and that we will in the future, our hearts and our understandings will meet with love and generosity."

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

In our listening to the Books of Ezra and Nehemiah we might gather how important was the prioritizing of the rebuilding of the temple prioritizing worship and then of the Holy City participants of the same. Inclusive of the members of the community (as we read on the memorial of the Guardian Angels) that the gathering was inclusive of CHILDREN OLD ENOUGH

TO UNDERSTAND. A different slant or perhaps another way of regarding the passage might be an appreciation that we are all Children of God and as we appreciate we are brothers and sisters in Christ. One of the early uses of the messenger (angel) was in the book of Exodus. We read " See, I am sending an angel before you to guard you along the way and to bring you to the place I have prepared". The word Guard (from the French



"garder" was to protect and keep watch.) In keeping with the memorial of the Guardian Angels we read from Matthew and a question was posed to Jesus. WHO IS THE GREATEST IN THE KINGDOM OF GOD? From what I gathered from commentaries the question comes after Peter and then James and John had been rebuked by Jesus. A kind of reprimand at their misunderstanding of what Jesus was moving in the direction of

accomplishing in His passion and death and resurrection. (How clear am I/are we to an understanding of Jesus?) Perhaps the question was asked to see if Peter or James and John (who had asked for a place at His right and left when He came into His Kingdom) were among the ones to be considered. Jesus's response 'unless you turn and become like children you will not enter the Kingdom of heaven'. Looking back to Nehemiah and the words 'children old enough to understand' do we appreciate what is it to be lifelong learners in seeking to be conscious of and understand the direction of life given us by Jesus's own teaching and example? Much like the book of Exodus we are reminded of the guidance of an angel as we move through life towards the promised land of heaven. The words 'unless you turn and become like children you will not enter the Kingdom of heaven' might suggest an orientation in life that needs redirection. Recall on Ash Wednesday we are blessed with the words TURN AWAY FROM SIN AND BE FAITHFUL TO THE GOSPEL. May we be open to being childlike in allowing our lives to be continually influenced by the divine messengers. In as much as Our Blessed Mother received the message of the angel Gabriel and responded MAY IT BE DONE ACCORDING TO THY WILL may we too respond in a manner to the teachings of Jesus as lifelong learners recalling THY WILL BE DONE ON EARTH AS IT IS IN HEAVEN.

From Bobbi Bugaj

The past week has been a reflection on gratitude and it happened in the strangest of ways. I have for years had limited movement (which got better after a hip replacement) and it always amazes me that even with those limitations I can get things done. Sometimes I do not even notice that God gave me the ability to make those adjustments. I get into a rhythm of prayer and praise, fed by Eucharist and find reconciliation, healing and there is peace even though the world outside is crazy. God puts people in my life that are supporting, (although they can laugh at me) and show me what the image of God looks like. I have thought about the meaning of my baptism. At my Baptism My Aunt Kay and Uncle Al, said my Baptismal promises for me and I have said those promises at my Confirmation. I started to think again about this as this week at our Parish School of Religion, I was doing an introduction to The Creed and I brought both the Apostles Creed and the Nicene Creed. Both begin with the same two words, "I believe." We say the Nicene Creed at Mass (and the Apostles Creed at Advent and Lent here at Saint Martin's) and it asks the question Do I believe? I heard something that Jaroslav Pelikan (Yale University scholar) once said about creeds "To believe one thing is also to disbelieve another...To say yes is also to say no." Over the years I have asked myself in different forms, do I believe in one God or do I believe in other gods too. Where is my pride, my jealousy about life My "I believe" has been my strength in some of the most devastating moments of my life. My faith, my "I believe" has stood by me in the good times too. I can see God in the world and the image of God in others. I do not want to know what my world would look like without my firm faith and trust in God. My "I believe" has brought compassion, mercy and forgiveness in my life. A renewal of my baptismal promises at Mass. I say "I believe" at Mass right before the Prayer of the Faithful and then we go straight into the Liturgy of the Eucharist. The first prayer, said once the Altar is set up, is "Blesses are you, Lord God of all creation, for through your goodness we have received...". I announce what I believe and then I am fed to go out into the world and let the world see. I ponder the statement of Jesus "who do you say that I am?" I answer that in the Creed but the two words "you say" stand out, it asks am I just saying it or do I really believe it. My words and actions must go together and must carry to the outside world. I had fun with this reflection of myself and the words on it that need a closer reflection in the internalization of the words. My last thought about the Creed is that it is a statement of belief statement of love and a statement of healing. **I love it.**
