They will offer due sacrifice to the Lord, said the prophet Malachi in the first reading. Mary and Joseph took Jesus up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord, said St Luke in the Gospel for today. And when the parents of Jesus make their offering and present him to the Lord, Simeon

sees the salvation which you prepared in the sight of all the peoples: a light for revelation to the Gentiles.

This is St Luke's way of saying that in some way, all humanity is contained within this tiny being. All the efforts, all the sufferings, all the joys of Christ's body, the Church, are already present in principle in the Child who is presented in the Temple on this day. And Mary who is Mother of the Church, offers to the Father all the children who will be hers, so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed. All our thoughts, then, and all our actions, should be the kind that Mary can present to the Lord.

If we are to become an offering welcomed by the Lord from the hands of Mary, then we will need solitude of heart. Our heart is a temple greater than the one at Jerusalem. We must be alone in this temple, with only God with us, and with Mary to present us. There should be a great silence there, like the outdoors when snow covers the ground. If we're thinking critical thoughts about situations or other people, then the temple of our heart is a noisy place, and the offering of all we do cannot have its full effect.

We should be free from all anxiety even in regard to ourselves. Certainly we should be sorry for our sins and do all we can to grow better every day, but the thought of our imperfections should never become a preoccupation. It's God we should be thinking about, more than ourselves. The best way to prepare ourselves to be offered in the temple by Mary is to concentrate on fulfilling God's will.

In many ways, this feast of the presentation is a kind of icon of the spiritual life, which is why it is the World Day for Consecrated Life in most countries. The spiritual life consists precisely in allowing ourselves to be offered up by the hands of Mary, so that we can be presented to the eternal Father. She had no need for purification according to the law, but we do need it, all of us, if we are to receive Jesus, the Light of the Father. When Mary went to the Temple, it was not for her own sake, but for ours, in our name, for the purification of all humanity, so that we in turn might receive Jesus.

This, finally, is the offering that will please the Lord, when Mary presents us to the Father. He gazes unceasingly at us, as Jesus looks into the eyes of Mary in the lovely statue at the monks' entrance to the church. I think of Jesus as seeing each one of us in the eyes of Mary. When the eyes of faith can meet his gaze, all that we do is lit up; everything becomes clearer and more transparent. We realize the brightness and the beauty of a life which is genuinely consecrated to God.

When we look back at him with the eyes of faith, it is the Face of Love that we see, and we are no longer afraid. We look at Jesus present in the Host we are to receive, and we see with the eyes of faith that his gaze and ours meet, and merge in an eternal communion.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Liturgically speaking, we completed the cycle of readings having to do with Samuel (both books). Presently we are in the book of Kings. Thursday's reading dealt with the transfer of authority as David passed along the Kingship to Solomon.

I found it somewhat interesting that the section or verses offered skipped over some verses that came in a form of warning (perhaps) and an awareness of the members of the former reign that might need some culling or cautious



approaches. Things had gone poorly after the incident with Bathsheba and there were a variety of characters that appeared that were part of the decline of the Kingdom. In a word, the counsel given was to be attentive to those in your company and aware of their past influence. There was an old adage shared with me that if you 'lie down with

stray dogs, you may get up with fleas'. Solomon later asked for wisdom. We recall the prayer of Reverend Reinhold Niebuhr which speaks of Wisdom. The prayer runs 'living one day at a time,' 'enjoying one moment at a time,' 'accepting hardship as a pathway to peace,' taking as He did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it, trusting that He will make all things right, if I surrender to His will, that I may be reasonably happy in this life, and supremely happy with Him forever in the next. A version perhaps not as the familiar course we appreciate that the Gospel for that day was from Mark and the sending of the first disciples to act in the name of Jesus and were missioned two by two and also with an admonition about 'shaking the dust from your feet' if you are not received well. That does give me the thought about the ONE who accompanies us through life and what kind of company we keep with others that might be a source of transformation as we bring Christ into every relationship that we encounter. Do we pray for the kind of wisdom to seek to be helpful in developing a culture that is the Kingdom? In asking for wisdom (as Solomon did) we can navigate through our day to day as a people attentive to being transformative presences in the lives of others. The disciples were missioned in Mark's gospel that day. we also read in Matthew 10:16 "Behold I am sending you like sheep in the midst of wolves, so be as shrewd as serpents and simple as doves." (on another subject interesting how the dove appears in Noah as well as cited by the sacred author at Jesus' baptism). may our own baptismal call seek the wisdom in the company we keep each time we too are missioned.

What is Lent going to look like for me this year? I started asking myself that question about a week ago. Am I going to add or subtract something that would help me focus on priorities in my faith that might have been neglected gotten moved to the side. (As of this writing I have not decided. I am sort of a last-minute girl.) Then I started to go down a path of thought that seemed very revealing. I thought of the words that kept popping up in my mind, Confession, repentance, lamentations and redemption. Then I thought of the words "wilderness" and "desert." Depending on how you define them they can be vastly different things but can hold the same outcome. Without the right path, without the right help or instruction one can perish in both. But the path that I have followed, the instructions that I receive, the time in prayer and silence, the Mass, the sacraments all keep me on a path of holiness that becomes the balance in this world I walk. That path, that balance, that faith keeps me centered and it does not matter if I am walking in a wilderness or desert. It does not matter if the sun is shining on hard soil and sand or if I cannot see the sun for the trees. I have a way to follow until I get out of both. The Spirit leads and I follow. My steps can be tentative and scary, but I follow anyway. The Spirit will ask "hey, you did this, are you sorry?" I always am, and I repent and go to confession. Some are more lamentations. I feel deep regret and sorrow. I catch my breath even thinking about it and they are the hardest. Because God can forgive me, I can be absolved in Confession and then I have to learn to forgive myself. I am always grateful for the grace of God that can forgive me so much easier than I can sometimes forgive myself. It is in the grace of God's compassion, forgiveness and mercy that I love Lent. If God can forgive me so much that he sent his Son to redeem me, so that I can walk what is sometimes such a desert or wilderness path but it is always love. In this world that can be desert and wilderness at the same time, I will not become lost in this world. I am guided by the Spirit. It is in Lent that I rejoice so much at Easter. Every Lent as I start asking myself the same questions every year, I search for the Light that keeps me on this path. The Light of Christ glows in my heart like the Paschal Candle coming into the dark church at the Easter Vigil. burning bright and a beacon of Love. I smile as I think of God's love and how it has no beginning or ending. Every year Lent asks something of me. It asks that I search my heart for something lost or replaced and put Christ back at the center of my heart where he belongs. I am excited about this Lent and the path to Easter and eternal life. I smile as I rebalance my life so that Christ is the center. And I am excited even though desert and wilderness is ahead, because Christ is always there, I just need to hold him where he belongs.

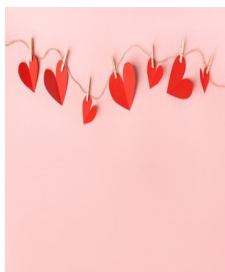
